STOUFFVILLE — In their final game of the season, to decide the league champions, Stouffville's Men's Basketball team, the Souses, were haunted by the Baseline Bullets bug-a-boo, which stayed with them until the last fourteen seconds of the last quarter when Pistol Jim Fletcher tossed a beautiful 'long basket' to tie the game and go into three minutes of overtime. Fletcher had broken his throwing hand, on a 'hard block', by one of the Bullets players. Despite the handicap, the Souses came through with a balance of fast breakaways and a solid blocking defence which paid-off at the final whistle. It was as close a game as has been played all season, with the Bullets making the visitors fight for every point. The final score of 54-51 could have easily been reversed. TRUDEAU WANTS US TO BUY FOREIGN OIL.

Canada has more oil than Saudi Arabia. We have enough to meet our needs for at least the next 100 years. But by the year 1990, Trudeau wants us to import more than a third of the oil we use. 2. Oil Supply Development

A P.C. government will work with the provinces involved to increase oil sands and heavy oil production so that by the early 1990's synthetic oil will be supplying Canadians with over half of our requirements. That will make it possible to meet all of our needs from Canadian sources.

3. Taking advantage of what we've got

Canada also has ample supplies of natural gas. We'll set the price of gas at a level which will make it attractive for Canadians to substitute gas for oil where they can do so.

4. Joining West to East

The logical next step is to ensure that Canadian energy supplies can get to Eastern Canada. A P.C. government will make sure that the eastern provinces are connected to Canadian gas, oil and electricity systems.

5. Energy supplies from nature

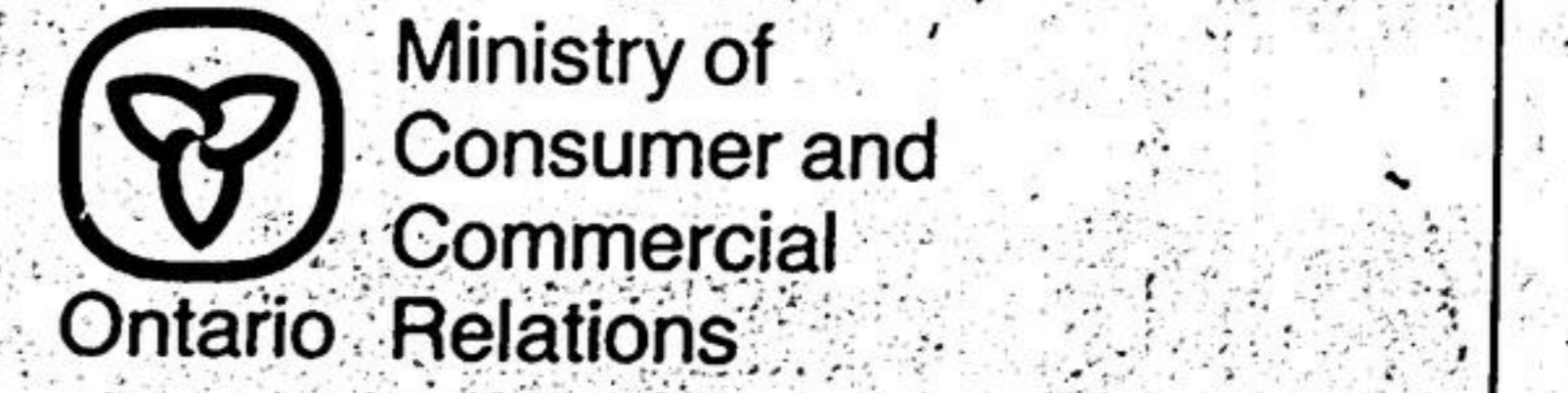
