What then is the answer?
In my opinion, such a place (I dislike the word drop-in), must represent some sort of challenge; some kind of activity. Otherwise, instead of pill-popping on the streets, they'll be pill-popping in a hall. That's what we found - too late.
I'm not one for throwing cold water on the endeavors of others. Negative thinking is all too common with Canadians. However, I thought I'd pass on my experiences for what they're worth. Maybe Stouffville's Centre will be different. I sincerely hope so.
