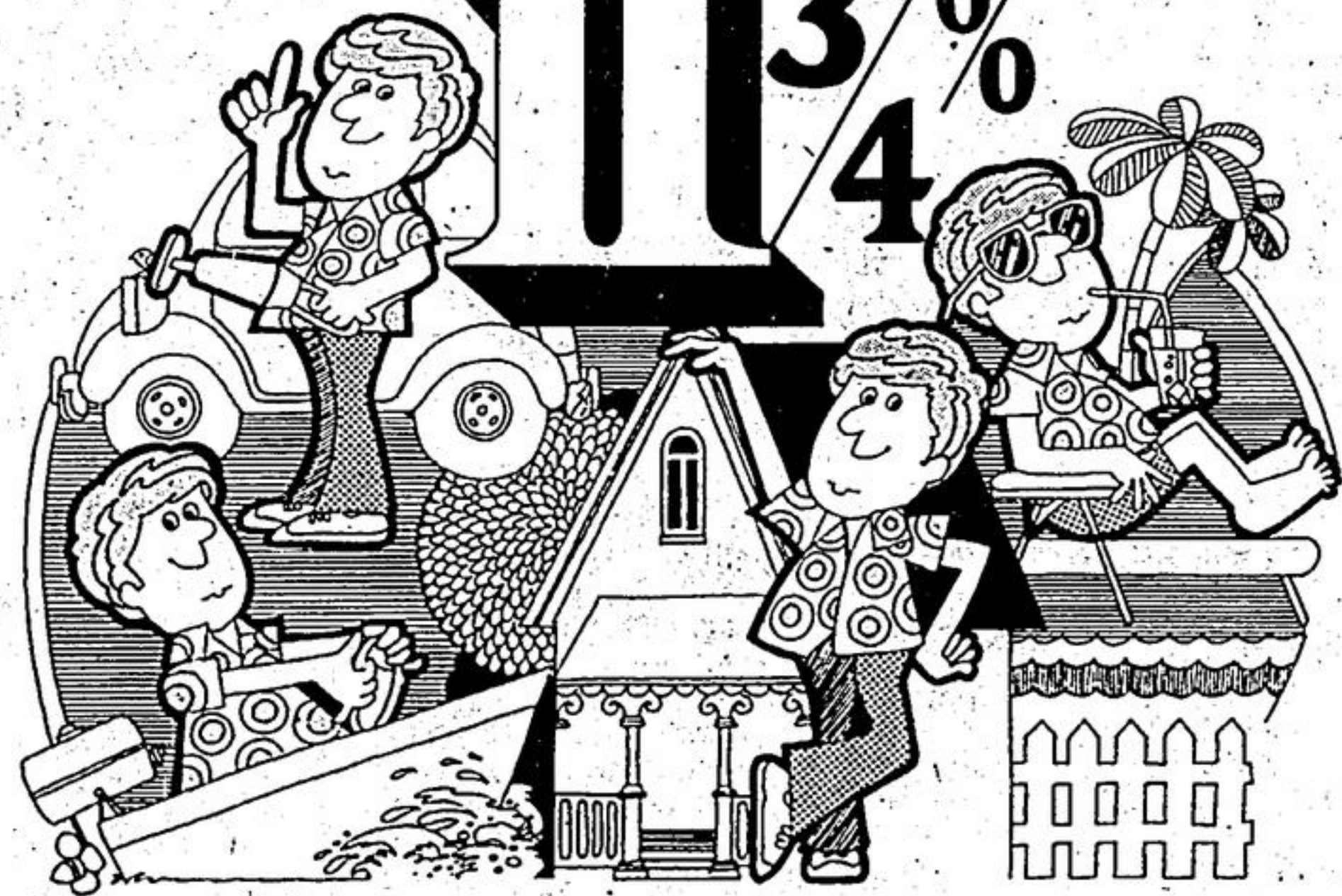
and trucks; getting cut by broken beer bottles or witnessing kids drinking beer openly in public places.

Evidence in essay

UNIONVILLE — When a Grade 2 teacher at a school in Unionville requested her pupils to write an essay on a particular subject, one little lad told of a Mynah bird in his home that kept repeating the words "hello Sam".

This twiggled the teacher's memory to a news story she'd read earlier concerning the alleged theft of four exotic birds from Garden Mart Ltd., 5132 Hwy. 7, west of McCowan Road.

She told the principal and he called the boy's parents. The mother admitted an older boy had brought a rare bird into their house and was wanting to take it back.

When the Mynah bird was not returned, police took up the investigation and arrested two suspects, one 21 year old from Markham and a 19 year old from Unionville.

Three of the Garden Mart's "feathered friends" are now back. The other, a small parrot, "flew the coop" and hasn't been seen since. All were owned by Jim Mitchell, 23 Deviation Road, Unionville.

The two accused will appear in Newmarket Court, June 26.
