STOUFFVILLE — It seems only fitting that a girl who worked part-time in a drug store should pursue a career in medical work.

Though the pharmacy job is really only a coincidence, this fall Judy Brillinger will complete the last of a two year course in medical records administration at St. Michael's Hospital.

The pretty twenty-year-old is this week's "Girl Next Door".

Many people will remember her behind the counter at Houston's Pharmacy. During her grade 12 and 13 years at Stouffville Secondary School she was employed there.

This summer Judy has a job at Grace Hospital in Toronto in the medical records department, right in line with her career ambitions.

The resourceful girl hit upon the idea through a student guidance information service. A computer provided her with information on several career possibilities after she fed it her interests.

Courses at Ryerson and the University of Toronto are part of the rigorous program, in addition to practical work at the hospital.

**Girls study in England**

BALLANTRAE — Two Ballantrae teenagers have set off for England to combine a rich learning experience with the "holiday of a lifetime."

Bonnie Collins, 17, and Elizabeth Morrison, 18, both students at Stouffville District Secondary School, are currently taking part in a five week study course entitled, "British Civilization."

The program is based at Brunel University near Uxbridge, England, where the girls are living in residence.

The material that Bonnie and Elizabeth will be covering is equivalent to that of a grade 13 english course. If successfully completed, the girls will receive one credit towards their Secondary School Honor Graduation diploma.

While the course spans many centuries of literature, much like any typical grade 13 english program, "British Civilization" students have the great advantage of being immersed in the very environment which inspired many of the great literary works.

Bonnie and Elizabeth will put in a total of 100 hours of classroom time, and another 100 hours devoted to excursions to places of literary and historical interest. As well, the students will be attending various theatres, concerts, ballets and operas.

Some of the places Bonnie and Elizabeth were excited about visiting include Buckingham Palace; The House of Commons; Canterbury; Cambridge; and the Marble Arch.

The Ballantrae girls are in select company. Only 20 students were selected from Ontario to participate in this unique program.

In addition to the Canadians involved in the course, Bonnie and Elizabeth expect groups from "all over the world" to add an international flavour to the learning

experience. Supervising the trip is Esther Beaupre, a retired English Dept head. To complete the course the students must keep a journal of their experiences, as well as write a 800 - 1,200 word essay relating to curriculum material.

In addition to their studies, Bonnie and Elizabeth plan to make the most out of their journey to England by tracing their family trees in their spare time. By the sound of all the activities planned in the course, it doesn't appear as if the girls will have much "free time," at all.

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
