Society is ten years old

By ED SCHROETER MARKHAM — The Markham District Historical Society is ten years old.

The museum "just keeps growing and growing," the curator and founding president John Lunau told The Tribune.

"We've had ten years of success," Mr. Lunau said. "I can't believe all the things that have taken place."

The historical society began with 75 members, a few acres of land on Hwy. 48 north of sixteenth avenue and the former Mount Joy School building.

Now the site, which covers 19 acres, includes the school, a log house, the Hoover house, the Chapman house, the Koch-Burkholder home, the Cedar Grove Blacksmith shop and a huge new implement display building.

There are many more buildings disassembled and crated, waiting to be restored and erected. Eventually the group hopes the site will be the home of a model village.

"We're trying to save something outstanding of the different types of architecture of the pioneer days," John said.

There is no shortage of exhibits on display, either. "We have many thousands of artifacts here today," the curator added.

He noted one of their biggest supporters was the Town of Markham. Regional Councillor Alma Walker and Councillor Elson Miles were two of the society's founding members.

However, he gave the bulk of the credit for the operation's success to the museum's many other supporters. Without the help of the many people too numerous to all name, the project wouldn't have progressed the way it

has, according to Mr. Lunau. "There's so many of them," he explained.

Some of those he honored at the society's celebrations are: Sim Reesor, Austin Reesor, Frank Barkey, Archie Little, the late Fred Wicks, the late G.B. Garlatti, Aileen Lunau, the late Arthur Sinclair, Wilma Petch, Gwen Rimmer, Betty Campbell, Gordon Penny, former museum board chairman Eldred King (now mayor of Whitchurch - Stouffville), present museum board chairman Bill Hood, historical society president William Rutledge, and his assistant curator Mary Champion.

The Historical Society will be holding a dance on Friday, July 13 (tomorrow) to celebrate the opening of the new implement building and raise funds for the organization. Tickets are available at the museum.

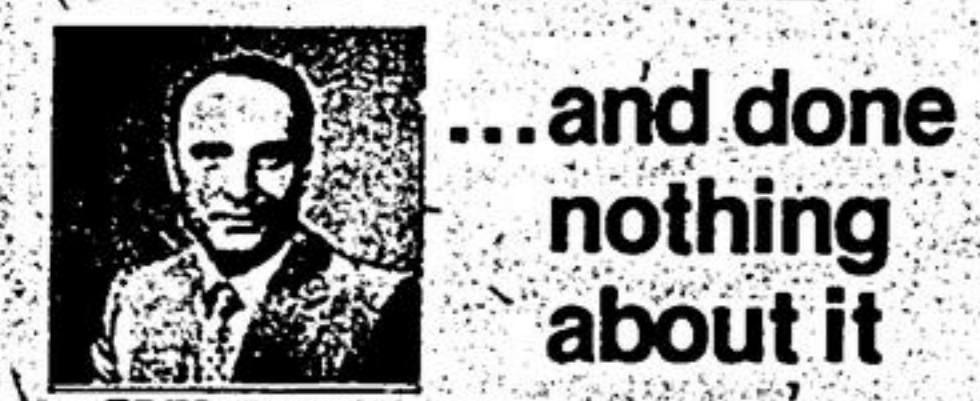
