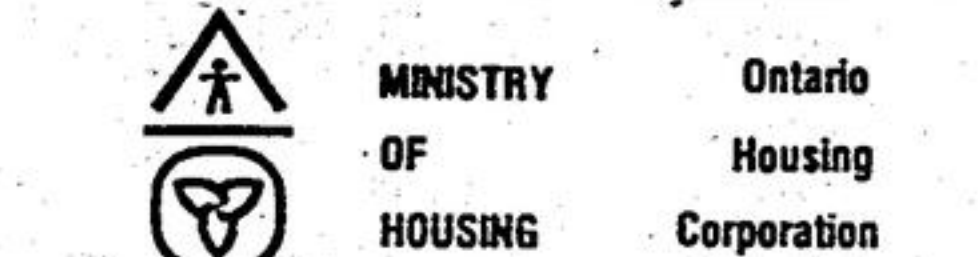

From Tribune files

Missing soldiers safe

What was front page news 37 years ago? In Stouffville, like all communities, the thoughts of most people were with the armed forces overseas. For Canada was in the thick of World War II and so were many of the young men from this area. To learn more about this and happenings in the district, the editor dug out The Tribune file of August-September, 1942 and discovered the following stories.

Private Fred Castle and Private Bruce Lintner, reported missing and feared dead following the Dieppe Raid, were

reported as prisoners of war in Germany. News that Bruce was safe, came to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Lintner on Thanksgiving Day. Mrs. John Castle received word on her son by way of a telegram from Ottawa. Fred's younger brother, Billie, gave his life for his country, the paper reported, when the ship on which he was serving, was sunk by a submarine in the North Atlantic. Due to a serious shortage of farm workers, Premier Heppburn announced a plan whereby the Continuation school in Stouffville would not reopen for the fall term until Oct. 9. This, he said, would allow young people to continue to assist with the harvest as part of the war effort. Thirteen year old Norman Lehman of Stouffville had his own way of assisting in the war effort. He harnessed his Billy goat to the

The Tribune reported more than 1,000 baskets of peaches on sale along the Main Street, with one merchant handling 400 baskets. The prices ranged from 39 to 59 cents per basket.

The Stouffville Machine and Tool Works was looked on as one of the most important industries in town, 37 years ago, with sixteen employees on the payroll, including five girls.

Mrs. Malcolm Conner of Musselman's Lake reported a squash in her garden measuring 36 inches around and standing 18 inches high. There was also a cucumber 1 1/2 inches long and a single vine bearing 31 tomatoes.

Ross Ratcliff escaped injury despite the fact he drove his tractor through the end of the barn and dropped about nine feet to the yard below. The machine suffered a damaged radiator and a broken axle.

accident on the farm of his cousin, Cliff Lemon. According to the paper, Mr. Lemon attempted to release a knot of straw that had become entangled in the shredder when he was caught by the knife. Cliff Lemon and Jack Carr rushed him to the office of Dr. Ball in Stouffville and then on to hospital. Eugene remained conscious during the entire ordeal. The Tribune said. Those engaged at the threshing bee at the time included - Herb Burnett, Bert Paisley, Elmer and Dawson Lemon, Cliff Lemon and Jack Carr.

A wedding photo appeared on Page 1 of the Sept. 3 edition of The Tribune in 1942. The bride and groom were Mr. and Mrs. Earl Crowder; the bridesmaid, Lola Forsyth and the best man, Lorne Crowder.

The following enlistments in the armed forces were reported: George Morden and Harry Davis signed up with the Royal Canadian Artillery; Arthur Russell was planning to enlist in the R.C.A.F. and Ted Cadieux, employed at Ratcliff Grocery, has also joined the airforce, the paper said.

A farm auction on the property of W.D. Hall at Lemonville, realized sales at close to \$4,000. The auctioneer was John Prentice, uncle of Clarke Prentice. Cows sold for \$150 and eight week old pigs brought \$7.00. The farm tractor sold for \$600 and the grain binder, \$185. A rubber tired buggy brought \$28.00.

Young mother

Relates horror of knife attack

YORK REGION - A young mother, testifying from a wheelchair, her hands still bandaged, told of the horror she experienced when a 35 year old man entered her home during an afternoon back in October.

Thelma Dancy was a witness at a preliminary hearing before Judge F.D. White in Newmarket Court. The accused, Jairo Sacamante, charged with attempted murder, break and entry, wounding and escaping custody, was committed for trial by judge and jury.

Mrs. Dancy said she'd been out shopping with her 18 month old baby and a housekeeper. When she returned about 5:30 p.m., she noticed a door open. On entering, she said a man, identified as Sacamante, put a knife to her throat and demanded money. She told of her attempt to escape and how the accused kept striking at her with the knife. At one point, she said, she thought her fingers had been cut off. She told of receiving gashes on her face, head and chest. She felt sure she would be killed, she told the court. She was able to get away, she said, when the knife broke.

Once outside, she told of hiding behind a bush until her assailant left. Then she called a neighbor.

Mrs. Dancy said she had given the man about \$60. Later, she discovered jewellery, a T.V., radio,

Don Mills, representing World Vision International, told the gathering of the refugees' desire to become totally independent as quickly as possible. He said 95 per cent of all those who had settled here, had already paid the Canadian government for their air fare. What is needed now, he said, is moral support so they can adapt to the Canadian way of life.

"Don't treat them (the refugees) like china dolls," he urged. "That's
