The funeral of Ralph Williams of Midland was held at the Heise Hill Church, Aug. 29. Mr. Williams is a former Gormley resident.

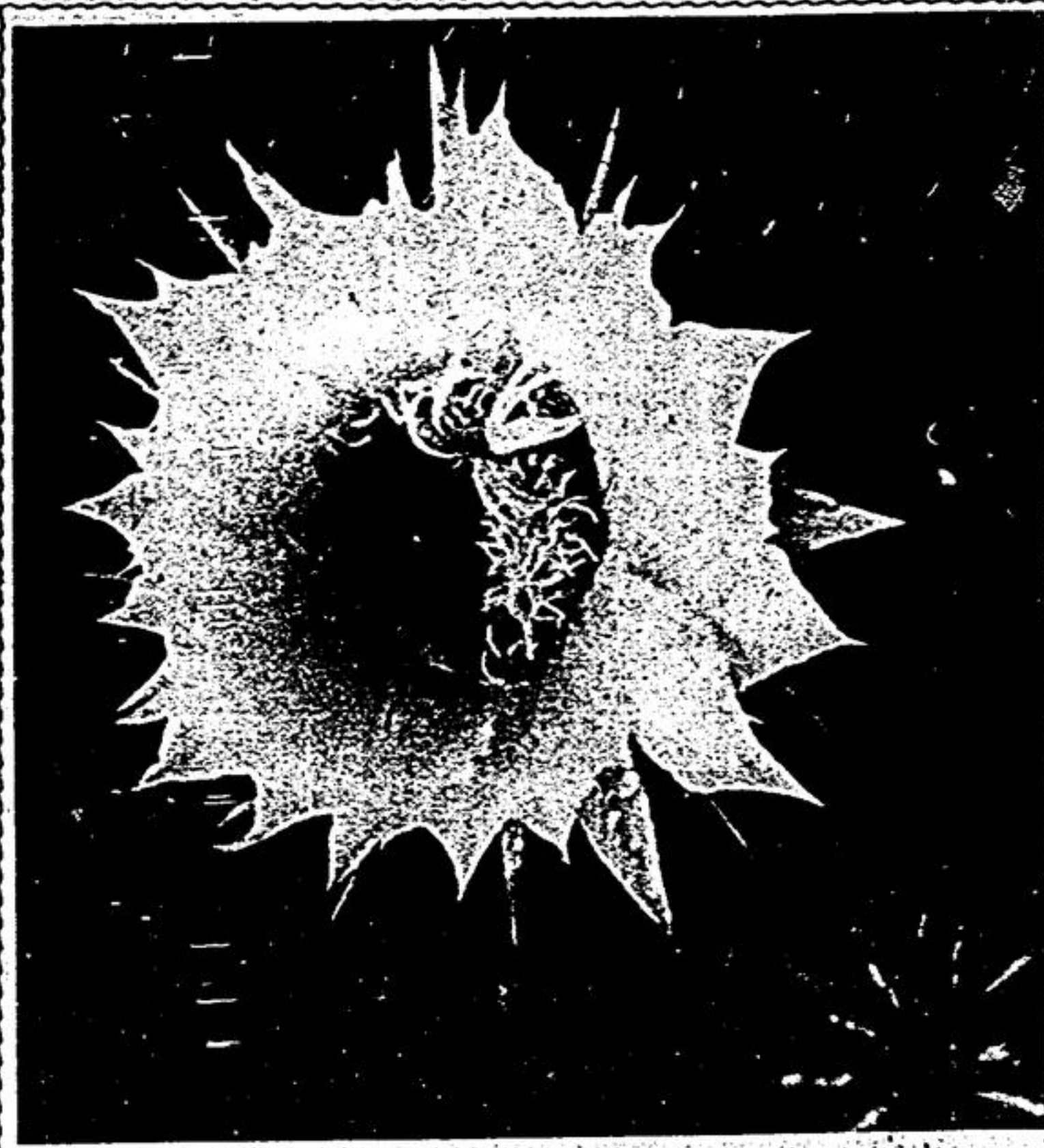
Mr. and Mrs. Godfrey Savage, (Caroline Hawkins) left Saturday

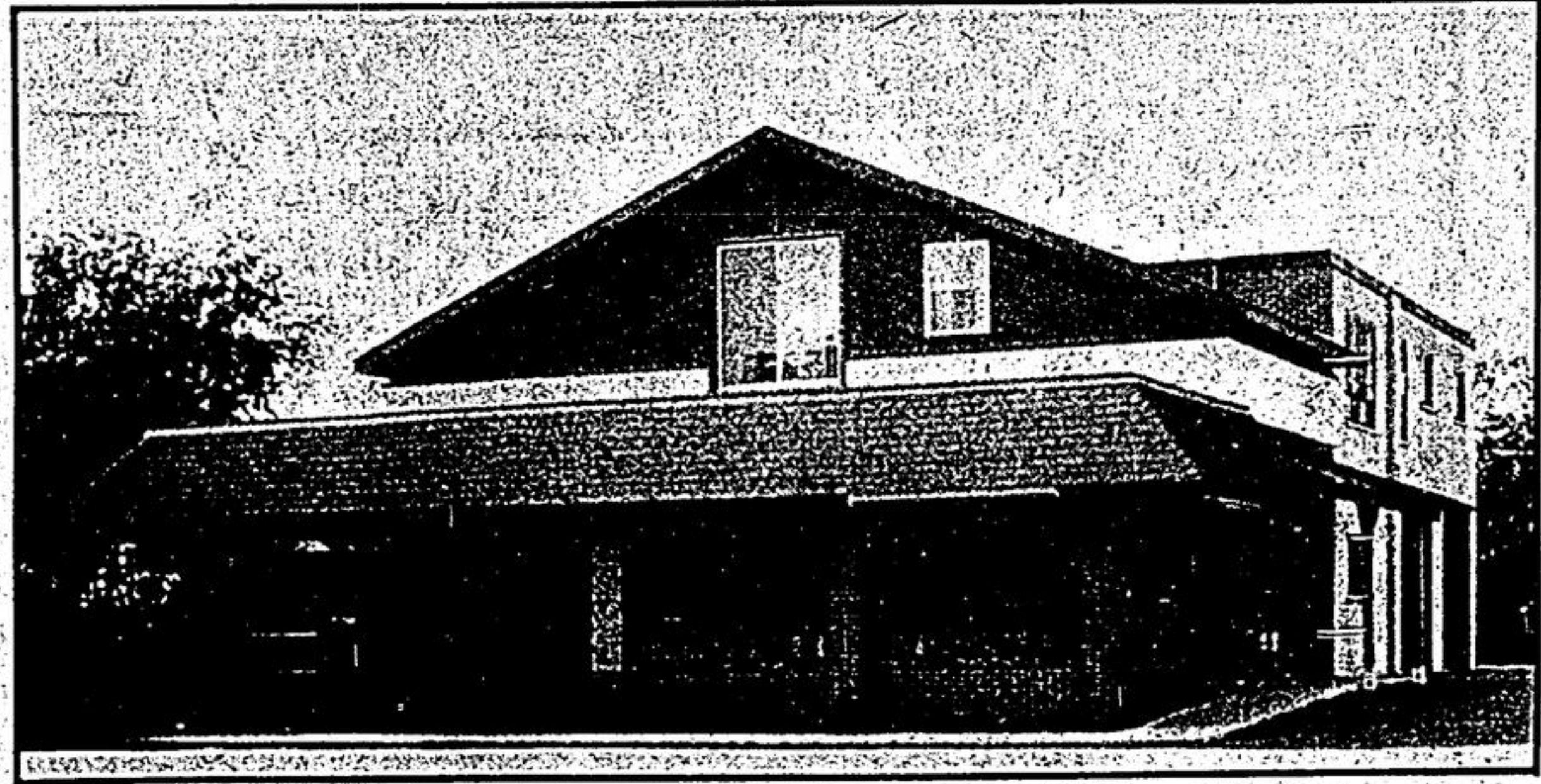
