Almost three months ago, the family of Richard and Lynn Poeltl, 496 Elm Road, found a baby Blue Jay in the backyard of their home.

The boys, Ricky, 10; Michael, 7 and David, 4 immediately "adopted" the tiny bird and, with the help of their parents, provided it all the nourishment required. They called it "Jay-Jay". Unfortunately, Jay-Jay's recovery took a turn for the worse when it broke its leg. But all wasn't over. At no cost, a staff member at the Stouffville Veterinary Clinic fixed him up with a splint. He's now good as new.

Jay-Jay's so appreciative of the personal attention he's received, he doesn't want to leave. He suns himself on the clothesline and sleeps on a perch under the patio. His diet includes grasshoppers and spiders, mulberries, bran, apples and raw fish. He's so much a part of the family, he'll eat out of their hands.

So far, Jay-Jay has shunned all appeals from seniors in the species to fly off with them, and this pleases the Poeltl children. They want him to stay.
