# New league

**STOUFFVILLE** — Remember when you were a boy and just could not get enough hockey. Those months between hockey seasons seemed to drag on forever.

So you did the next best thing - grabbed a hockey stick, tennis ball and headed for the road for a game of road hockey.

Today, Ball Hockey is a well organized, highly competitive sport. In Ontario alone there are twenty affiliated leagues, comprising of 125 teams and 3,200 players. Five other provinces, and one territory, now have ball hockey associations.

Eric Scaife, former president of the London Ball Hockey League would like to see a ball hockey league here in the York County region.

Between the area of Oshawa and Orillia there are no organized ball hockey leagues in operation. Eric's objective is to set up a York Regional Ball Hockey League during the summer of 1980-81.

In order to promote this venture, Eric has arranged an exhibition game between the London Huron House Hawks (former Southwestern Ontario Champions) and the Stouffville Selects ball hockey team.

The rules are the same as in ice-hockey except for a couple of modifications such as a 'floating blue line' and the imposition of a five minute penalty, for checking a player into the boards. Two line passes are also allowed.

The ball used is the size of a tennis ball and is virtually 'bounce-free'. It does however have a tendency to curve when fired slap-shot style. Consequently, the goal tender wears a complete set of protective gear.

Teamwork is also stressed. Anyone who has played in the street, as a youth, knows the problems of stick-handling on a dry surface.

On Friday September 14 at 10:00 p.m. you will be able to witness the introduction of this sport at the Markham Arena (corner of Hwy. 7 & 48). Come along and see the most exciting of sports. Admission is free.

### Tune-up, Clean-up

Heavy dust on your refrigerator coils makes it work harder to keep its cool. An occasional vacuuming of the coils behind or underneath the refrigerator can help it last longer and it won't use more electricity than it has to.
