Landmark home sold

STOUFFVILLE — Stouffville's famous "Gingerbread House" at 179 Main Street West, has been sold. The purchasers are a young couple who've had their eye on the home for several years. The price was \$91,000.

On the market since May of 1978 and vacant almost a year, the property has been cared for by Fred Crossen, Church Street South.

The residence was built in the 1880's by J.L. Baker, great-grandfather of Mervyn Baker, Stouffville, R.R. 2. J.L. Baker, one-time reeve of Stouffville, was an accomplished stone mason and brick-layer.

The house possesses marvellous antique features, and the exterior is considered a work of art.

The new owners plan to restore the interior to its former beauty and use it strictly as a private home.

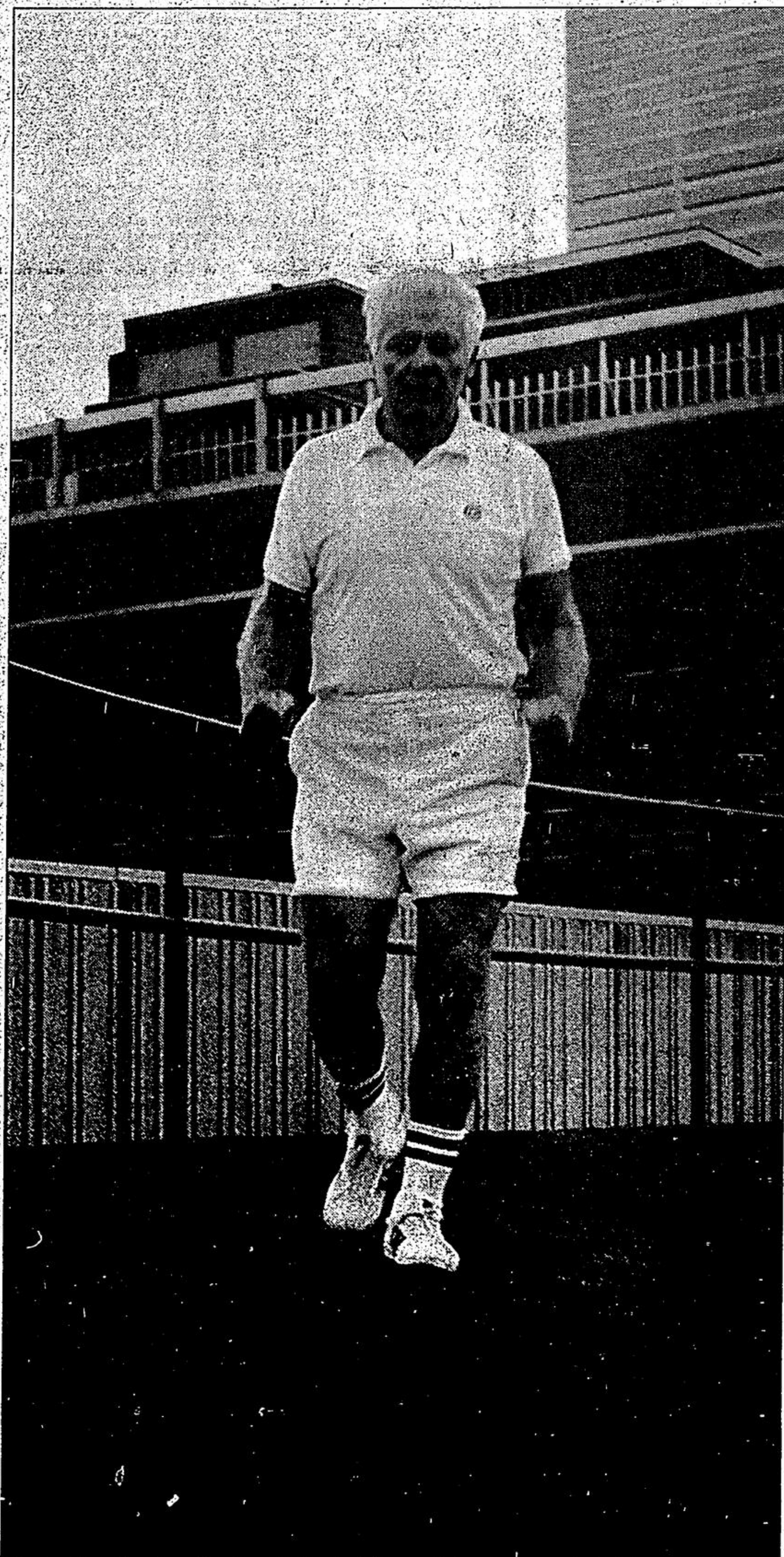
Safeguard Real Estate Ltd., had the listing. Fran Sainsbury of Gerry Meharg Ltd., Realtor, handled the sale.

Joe O'Kell is back on the track because arthritis research is paying off.
