Mrs. McWhinnie, the former Margaret Ribby, was born at Brantford, the daughter of Edward and Margaret Ribby. She received her elementary and secondary school education there, excelling in athletics.

Margaret McWhinnie was an obstetrical supervisor at St. Joseph's Hospital, Toronto, then went on to take a post-graduate course at the Orthopaedic Hospital in New York. During World War II she served as a member of a nurses' first aid team.

Margaret and Wilf were married in 1942 and moved to Stouffville 22 years ago. She retained a love of sports including golf, tennis and horse racing. She also enjoyed playing bridge.

In 1975, she and her husband took a trip to Ireland where Margaret gained great satisfaction from visiting the homeland of her parents.

Surviving besides her husband is a son, Kevin and a daughter, Jill, both of Stouffville.

The funeral service was in charge of Father Norbert Gignac. The pall-bearers were: Frank Mellon, John Foulds, Don Gibson and Paul Mathews, all of Stouffville, and Alex Wilkins of Woodstock. Interment was in Stouffville Cemetery.

Responding "beautifully" to continuing medical treatment and physiotherapy, Craig now plays road hockey to sharpen his reflexes for the day his doctors say he can return to the ice. He swims, coaches minor league goalies and has returned to regular school gym classes. Despite long absences, his school grades are excellent. Last term he won two scholastic awards - one for science and one for general academic achievement.
