Teach Suzuki system

STOUFFVILLE — Recently, an audience at Queen's University in Kingston, was treated to a superb concert of classical music. The "orchestra" was made up of children ranging in age from tiny tots to late teens. They played without music and without a conductor. And at the end, they received a standing ovation. How did it all happen?

It's called "the magic of the Suzuki system", a method so simple, it's like learning to speak.

The training method was conceived by Dr. Shinichi Suzuki of Japan. He started with the observation that language is picked up by children as a matter of course. The secret is environment and by providing an environment of music, Suzuki soon had boys and girls playing advanced compositions as naturally as they could speak.

Dr. Suzuki utilizes the natural teaching role of the parent, in fact, the method is not taught unless one parent joins the child in the process of learning. The reason is that the child learns by imitating parents. They learn through observation and by ear.

The whole approach is positive. No negative comment or criticism is employed. The child is never pushed beyond his or her ability. Progress is allowed to develop naturally. The pupil never fails.

Here in Stouffville, the Suzuki Method is being offered by Marg Hopkins. Mrs. Hopkins has spent 35 years in the development of her musical talent. Last year, she took advanced piano under the tutelage of Patrick Lee at the Toronto Conservatory. This past summer, she attended a course offered by Queen's University on the Suzuki concept of teaching and learning.

The experience resulted in a decision to employ the Suzuki method in her teaching of piano.

Licence divers

A Newmarket diver and former constable with the York Regional Police Department, died of asphyxia under the ice at Lake Scugog. Port Perry, while attempting to salvage a car, a coroner's inquest was told.

The hearing, under the direction of Dr. W.C. Patterson, was held at Whitby.

Glenn Payne, the victim, was lost in the water when the lifeline apparently slipped from his waist. The accident occurred Jan. 9 and his body was not recovered until April.

George Goldie, a Toronto diver, said Payne had gone no more than 10 or 12 feet from the hole in the ice, when the line broke free. A third diver, Dorman Coles, told how he searched the area in 45-foot circles, without success.

Both Goldie and Coles testified they had never participated in under-ice dives before and that Payne had been down about twenty times.

The jury ruled that the victim was with inexperienced helpers and that the 1/4 inch rope used was "suspect for the task".
