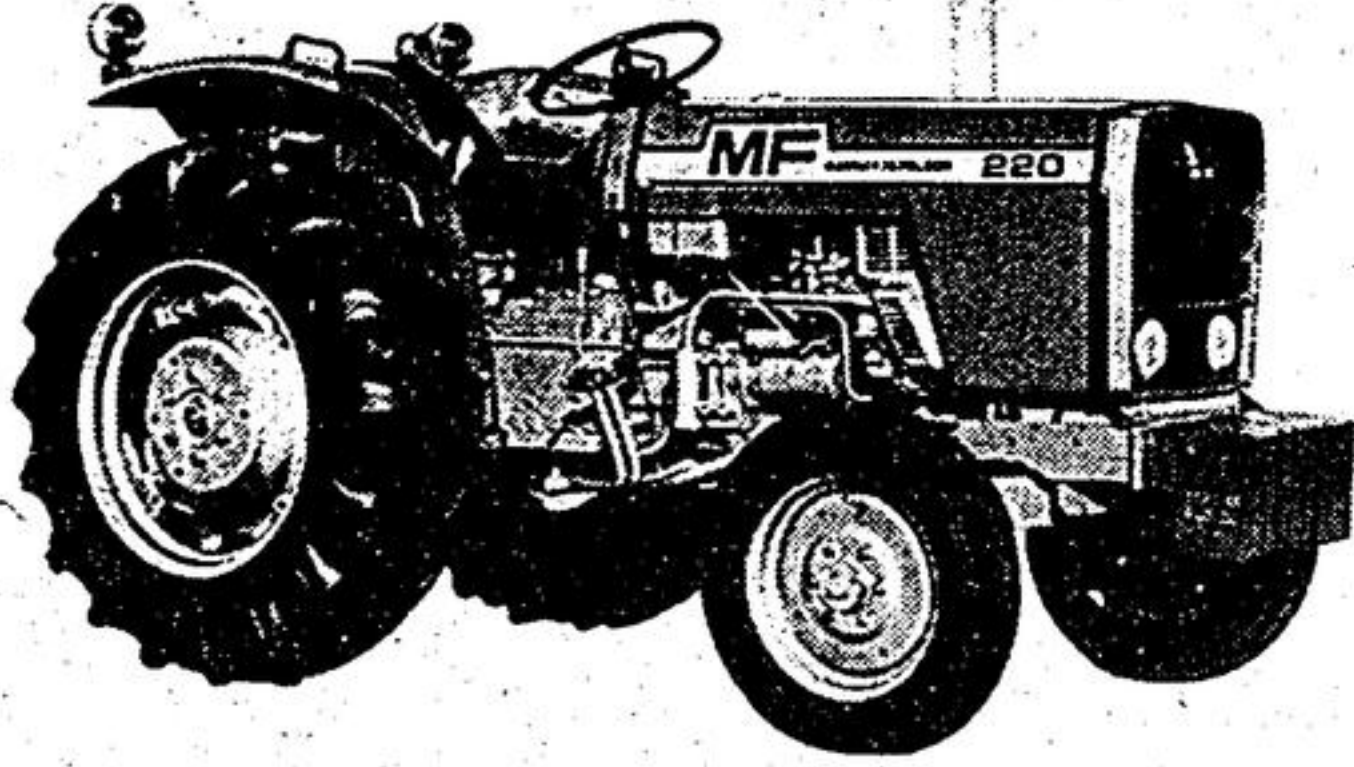

Children are people.

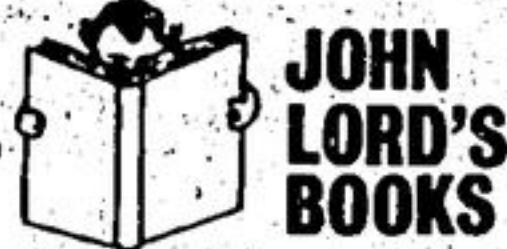
