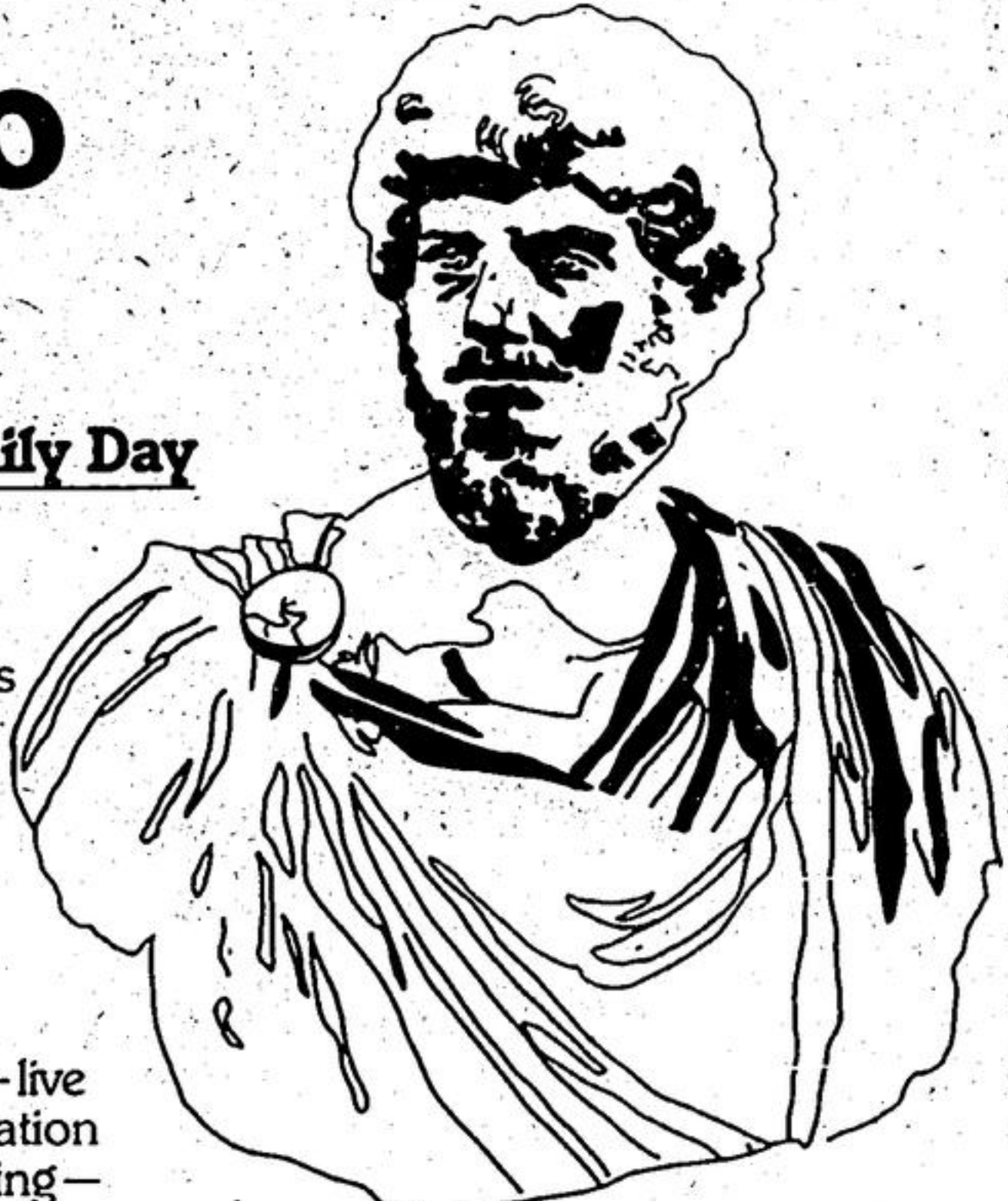

Jim Richards
Lions' president

STOUFFVILLE — A good working relationship between members of the Stouffville Lions Club is essential to ensuring its smooth and effective operation within the community.

That is the belief of the Lion's President for 1979-80, Jim Richards.

Mr. Richards stresses that members of the Lions are volunteers, and "you can't tell them what to do." He plans to "work with them," in hopes that the Lions will be able to "communicate with all aspects of society."

Jim Richards wants to increase the membership in the next year, with the club "building for the future."

Through various circumstances, the Stouffville Lions have been reduced to about 40 members at present, and the new president says it could use "another dozen."

"We can't operate without people...we especially need the young," he says.

While new members have to be "thoroughly screened" by the Lions' Board, those interested can contact the president

for further information.

The first planned event since Mr. Richards took office is a Car Craw, including a buffet and dance, slated for November. More details will be released in upcoming weeks.

Although activities will be similar to what the Lions have undertaken in the past, the president says he is "looking for new projects, too."

Possible events for the future include: a country and western

music show next summer; continuation of bikeathons; barbecue in conjunction with next year's Town Celebration; and annual Christmas tree sales.

Mr. Richards supports Immediate Past President Ron Lee's proposal of a Stouffville Leo Club, a youth arm that would involve area teens, and a Lionettes branch for local ladies.

"If enough people are interested, we definitely are," he said.
