Born at Ringwood, May 30, 1906, the son of Wellington and Mina Stouffer and brother of Charles and Jean (Mrs. Gordon Boyd) of Newmarket and Stewart of Stouffville, he later married Joyce Filyer, March 16, 1940. Bruce farmed on the 8th concession of Whitchurch until 1955, then moved to a farm near Cannington. In 1972, he retired to the Village of Cannington. Beside his wife, he leaves six children, Sherrill (Mrs. Chris Lawry) of British Columbia; Mrs. Lynda MacDonell of Chatham; Edward and Harold in Toronto; Robert at home; Christian, also in Toronto and six grandchildren. A private burial service was conducted Oct. 17 followed by a memorial service at Cannington Baptist Church, Oct. 19.

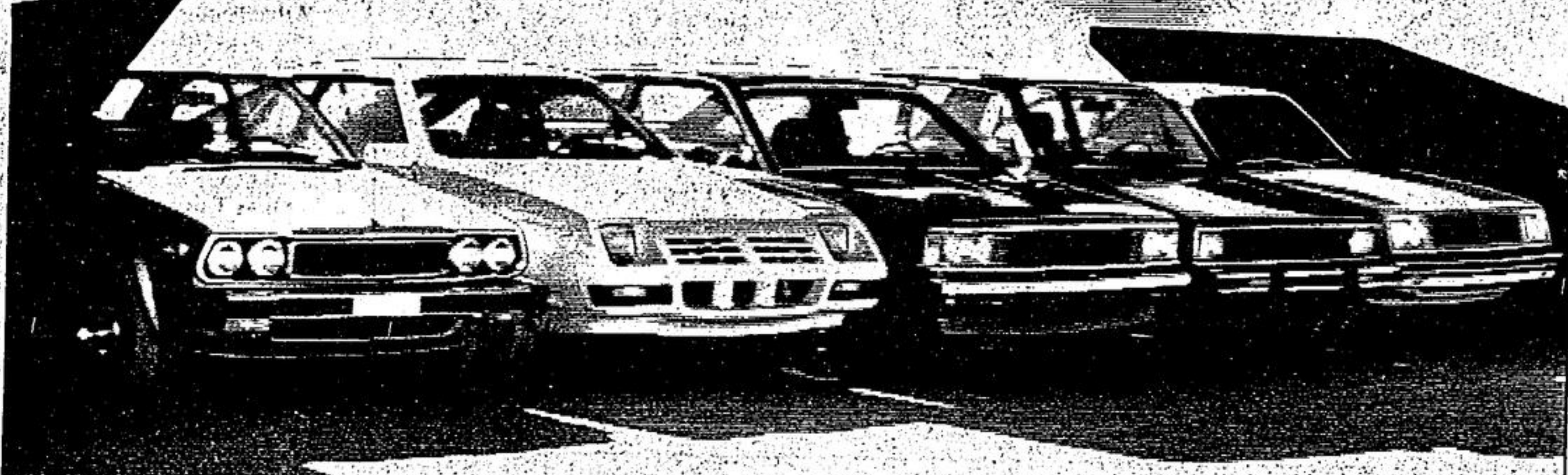
**Birthday gathering**

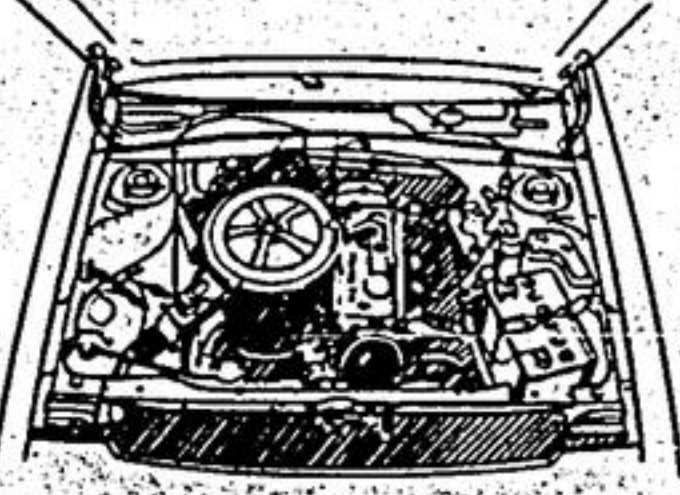
