Markham where he resided except for a short period spent at New Liskeard. A successful farmer, he could always find time to help a neighbor or friend. His smile and sense of humor were welcomed wherever he went. He was a kind and loving family man.

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Constable claims-

'Drink' at 18 "big mistake"

YORK REGION — A York Regional Police officer has voiced strong criticism over the government decision that lowered the legal drinking age from 21 to 18. Speaking at a seminar in Richmond Hill, United Church on drug and alcohol abuse, Constable Robert Cunningham called it "the biggest mistake they ever made". He also stressed that "good kids out there far outnumber the bad".

P.C. Cunningham told an audience of over 100 people how on different occasions when young people are brought into the station, he hears them talk about the responsibility their parents have to them.

feel it's high time some of them at age 15 and 16 got off their butts and realized they too have a responsibility to their parents".

Jack Passmore, chairman of York Central Hospital's community health committee pointed out that alcohol-related deaths rank third in Canada behind cancer and heart disease. In the last nine years, consumption of alcohol by Canadians had risen by almost 48 per cent, he stated.

Barrie Davey, secretary of the Ontario Inter-faith Liquor Legislation Committee and Public School Trustee June Armstrong claimed a stronger example by

parents in the home could serve as a deterrent to alcohol and drug abuse by teens. The schools, Mrs. Armstrong said, can do their part, but they require help from parents and young people to fight it.

Rev. Bruce McLeod claimed the problem was not related only to the kids. Addressing his remarks to several young people in the audience he said, "It bothers me that you are hassled for drugs and there are homes with cupboards filled with it". He said he knows of homes in the Rosedale district of Toronto where marijuana is used as commonly as salt and pepper.

All Stong, York Centre M.L.A., criticized the type of advertising used to promote liquor sales.

A move towards the decriminalizing of marijuana possession was also criticized by the panel. Barrie Davey said this had been done in the State of Oregon with the result, drug use had "skyrocketed".
