STOUFFVILLE — A ceremony, like no other held in Stouffville, will be conducted, Saturday afternoon at 4:30 p.m., in St. James Presbyterian Church. Wesley and Clara Brillinger, Parkview Apartments, will re-affirm their love and devotion on the occasion of their Golden Wedding Anniversary.

The well-known and highly respected couple will repeat their vows in the presence of all members of their family including sons Arnold of Timmins and Ron of Stouffville; daughters Dorothy (Mrs. Eldon Yake) of Goodwood, Marie (Mrs. Frank White) and Marilyn (Mrs. Jim Newton), of Stouffville; eleven grandchildren and one great-granddaughter. Rev. Ted Green will be in charge.

Mrs. Brillinger's

sister, Anne Balsor of Vancouver, British Columbia, will be the maid of honor. Her husband, Charles, will be Mr. Brillinger's best man. Ushers are two grandsons, Garry White of Stouffville and Steven Yake of Goodwood.

Wes and Clara will enter the church to Kenneth McKellar's beautiful vocal rendition of "I'll Walk Beside You". The ceremony will conclude with "The Lord's Prayer".

While the guest list numbers about eighty-five, others may attend if they wish, Mr. Brillinger said. The memorable event is part of their "open house" at Latcham Hall, Stouffville from 2 to 4 and 7 to 9 p.m. Wes and Clara will leave the hall for the church, then return for fellowship in the evening.

Born at Lot 10, Conc. 5, Whitchurch Twp., the

son of John B. and Ada Brillinger, Wes has given freely of his time for the betterment of the community. He served as chairman of the Area School Board and played an important part in masterminding the construction of Whitchurch Highlands School. He also undertook the task of organizing rural bus routes in Whitchurch at a time when that type of service was comparatively new. His biggest and perhaps most rewarding challenge was the operation of the Town museum, now at Vandorf. He was chairman of that Board for nine years and, with the help of Mrs. Brillinger, took on many of its most popular projects with little outside assistance.

Clara is a culinary specialist without equal. The goodness of her baking is known far and

wide. She also loves to knit.

Both are members in the congregation at St. James and attend services there regularly, in fact, Clara and her father, the late John Lehman, sang in the church choir when Rev. Fuller was the minister. At that time, the family lived in the home now owned by Dr. Helen Abell at the corner of Harold and Albert Streets.

It was there that they were married, Nov. 12, 1929. Rev. Walter Fleischer, now of Glen Arm near Argyle, performed the ceremony. He was then the pastor at Stouffville Baptist Church.

When the knot was securely tied, the happy couple departed in Wesley's Model "T" Ford for Toronto. On their return, they took up residence at Lot 11, Conc. 5, Whitchurch, now the farm owned by Burn Preston.

The depression years were tough. Wes and

Clara remember them well. Potatoes sold for twenty-five cents a bag. "And I had to supply the bag," he recalled. He remembers working for Clare Bolender at fifty cents a day.

They built their own house on the 5th concession. Clara nailed the gyproc, every piece, she recalls. Although conveniences were few, it was still "home". With no hydro, they used coal oil lamps. The luxury of electricity was installed by Maurice Pike. Clara churned for butter.

Wes remembers how he would drive their old Studebaker to Stouffville by the back roads because it didn't have licence plates.

All these are memories now. They're enjoying their new "home" at Parkview Apartments where friends are always welcome day and night. And they'll be welcomed, Saturday, at Latcham Hall, 2 to 4 and 7 to 9 with a "break" in between to reaffirm their love.

Wary of outside storage

BALLANTRAE — Whitchurch-Stouffville. Planning Board are receptive to industry in an area of the proposed Schickendanz Development at Ballantrae but are wary of outside storage close to future homes.

The site in question is north of the Aurora

Sideroad and east of Hwy. 48.

Seventeen industrial lots are anticipated, Hugh Macklin informed members, Nov. 6, with an internal road system 86 feet in width. The entrance, however, will be only 66 feet wide due to inability to acquire additional land.

Both councillors Jim Sanders and Jim Doble advised against outside storage visible to future home-owners. Councillor Doble said this had occurred elsewhere, creating problems.

The Board declined positive action on the zoning, pending consultation with the Town solicitor.
