Wreaths were laid by representatives of the Markham District Veterans' Association, the Federal and Provincial Governments, Markham's Silver Cross Mother and Town Mayor Tony Roman.

Prior to the parade to the cenotaph, a commemorative church service was held at the Veterans' Hall.

In his address: "The Path to Peace," the Rev. Alan B. Embree told a modern day parable of a peace loving Australian, who abhorred the thought of a predicted second world war, wishing only to continue his existence quietly on a remote island. To this end he fled to a peaceful site in the Pacific. The island was, ironically, Guadalcanal. Summing up he said: "There is no place in the world to hide from reality. The path to peace is very difficult to find."

The scripture was read by the Veterans' Association, President Charles Mullett.

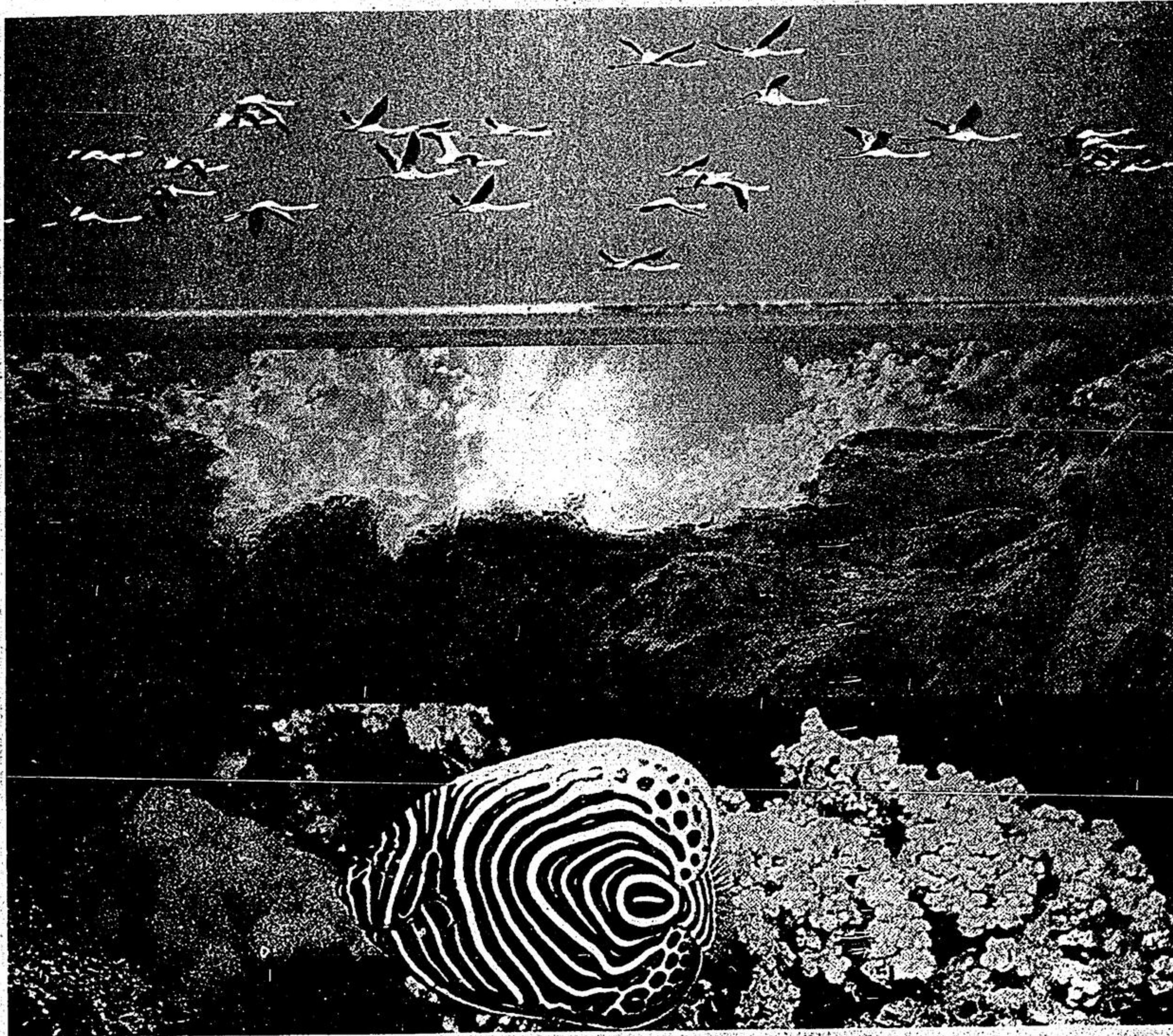
