Fire service recognized

STOUFFVILLE — Thirty years a volunteer fireman. That's the record of brigade deputy-chief Fred Castle.

As a moment of this milestone, he was presented with a Fire Service Medal at a gathering recently in Gravenhurst, only the second member of the present department to be so honored.

Chief Walter Smith received his 30-year medallion in 1977.

It was back in 1949 that Del Jennings, then the chief, requested Fred join the fire-fighting force in Stouffville. The hall was then located adjacent to the clock tower in the Civic Square.

"I've never regretted it for a moment. I enjoy trying to help other people out," he told The Tribune.

There are times, however, when a fireman feels so completely helpless, he points out. Like at a blaze in the country when there's insufficient water or attending an accident when people are dead or dying.

"When adults are the victims, it's bad enough, but when they are children, with their whole lives ahead of them, it's tragic," he said.

Fortunately here, deaths due to fire have been few in thirty years; only two. Property losses in several instances, have

been heavy; with the Ratcliff Block blaze by far the worst.

While Fred has attended several seminars, his knowledge comes mostly through experience. He has high praise for courses in first aid, calling them "a must" in this day and age.

The deputy-chief also has high praise for the department's new recruits, describing them as "eager beavers" and "a terrific bunch of boys".

It's that balanced combination of youth and experience that makes the Whitchurch-Stouffville Fire Department one of the most proficient in the province.
