That clerk, back in 1957, was Ralph Corner. now the administrator for the expanded Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville and soon to retire. The end of the year will mark the end of an era, not only for Ralph himself, but for those who hold him in high regard; certainly all members of his staff.

Ralph Corner has been a leader here, not often in public, more often behind the scenes, but a leader just the same. In more than two decades, mayors, reeves and councillors have come and gone, the administrator has remained to carry on. Until now. Dec. 31 is his last day on the job.

"I've enjoyed it. There's a lot of satisfaction in seeing things happen," he says. And a lot has happened as he only. knows. He can list the accomplishments, even to dates.


