STOUFFVILLE — One of the many pleasures experienced by the editor of Stouffville's weekly newspaper, is visiting the Municipal Office on Civic Street. The staff there are most cordial and extremely cooperative. Symbolic of this attitude is Pat Muir who, on Jan. 1, takes over the important position of Town Clerk.

This lovely lady with the soft, voice and pleasant smile, is one of the benefits derived from regional government. Pat was a receptionist-typist on the 'old' Whitchurch Township staff at Vandorf. When the two municipalities became one, she and several others, were incorporated into the new system with 'capital' headquarters at Stouffville.

"I sort of fell into it," is the way Pat describes her introduction to municipal life. Never one to "sit at home", she answered an advertisement for a clerical job in Whitchurch and was hired.

"I never thought I'd ever be the Clerk," she admits, "but I've never enjoyed anything more." Any success she's enjoyed, she credits to Ralph Corner, the Town's Administrator, soon to retire. "He's represented a sort of father image around here, a wonderful teacher," she said.

Pat vividly recalls the rather hectic time in which a village and a township were welded together into a Town. It was Mr. Corner, she remembers, who carried much of the load. In addition to reassuring the

Whitchurch staff that all would be well, he had to arrange accommodation for everyone in Stouffville, "otherwise, we would have been sitting on each other's laps".

But that's all history now. New challenges lie ahead and Pat's anxious to get on with the job.

"I've never enjoyed anything like this," she says, reaching for the phone to handle an incoming call, "it never gets boring, every day is different".

Although experience is important, the learning process was advanced

considerably when she enrolled in a clerk-treasurer's course at Seneca College.

Calling them "tremendous", "We get along great," she said.

When time permits, Pat says she tries to get in a few hours of knitting or crocheting. A family trip to Florida every winter is also a well-deserved break.
