

While snubbed 'up above', Gertrude is "queen of her court" on the ground. She waddles over from the barn and pecks at the back door to be let in.

The affection she shows for her master is touching. When Ernie feeds her pieces of bread, she snuggles up to him and caresses his cheek.

Ernie says Gertrude will limp as long as she lives. But apart from this, she'll lead a perfectly normal life.
