The current fuelwood own operations. boom may bring on more "tree rustling", wastage and accidents. This is the concern of forestry staff with the Ministry of Resources.

They've already noted an increase in wood thefts from private and public forests. Even Bob Staley, a regional forester, had a quantity of stacked firewood taken. from his own property near Stouffville. Official Plan Amendment No. 14, Section 4.3a.3.1 and Schedule "A1", to the Official Plan of the former Township of Whitchurch !

By-Law 79-40 amending By-Law 72-7 of The Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville. Amendment No. 14 of the Official Plan of the former Township of Whitchurch and affecting the Ballantrae-Musselman's Lake

area constitutes the Secondary Plan for that area. The Honourable Minister of Housing has referred to the Ontario Municipal Board Section 4.3a.3.1 of Amendment No. 14 which requires monitoring of the population of the Musselman's Lake area and stipulates that it shall not exceed 1;000 persons and in addition provides that if the cumulative effects of growth are recognized by contamination of the aquifer or of the lake prior to that population level being reached then no further development shall be permitted.

Milk size reduced

On Jan. 9, it was announced by the Ontario Dairy Council that the imperial quart milk container size will be cut down to a litre in the future - but the price will stay approximately the same. They argue that container and distribution costs will not go down even though the value of the goods will.

Surely the container can move to a 11/2 litre size, slightly larger than a quart, with the price increasing only the appropriate multiple of the present quart price.

The dairy producer will still get his proper payment and may even? sell more milk! The unit costs of distribution and containers will go down and the saving can be passed on to the public. There could be a 3 and 5 litre option, if they wish.
