Milk size reduced

On Jan. 9, it was announced by the Ontario Dairy Council that the imperial quart milk container size will be cut down to a litre in the future - but the price will stay approximately the same. They argue that container and distribution costs will not go down even though the value of the goods will.

Surely the container can move to a 1½ litre size, slightly larger than a quart, with the price increasing only the appropriate multiple of the present quart price.

The dairy producer will still get his proper payment and may even sell more milk! The unit costs of distribution and containers will go down and the saving can be passed on to the public. There could be a 3 and 5 litre option, if they wish.

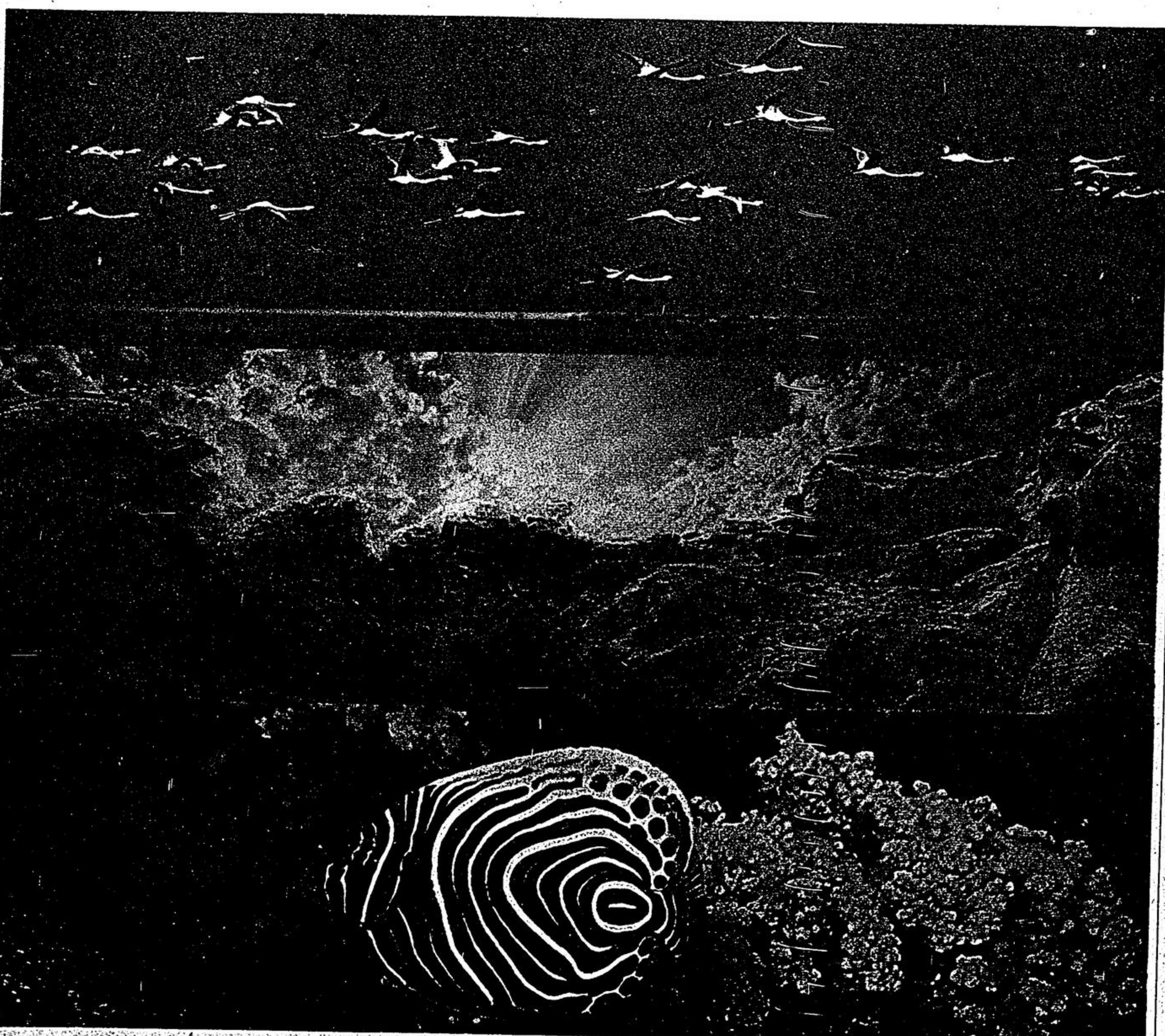

EXPLANATORY NOTE
 THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF WHITCHURCH-STOUFFVILLE
 IN THE MATTER OF Hearings by the Ontario Municipal Board commencing February 11th, 1980

Re: Official Plan Amendment No. 14, Section 4.3a.3.1 and Schedule "A1", to the Official Plan of the former Township of Whitchurch - and -

Re: By-Law 79-40 amending By-Law 72-7 of The Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville. Amendment No. 14 of the Official Plan of the former Township of Whitchurch and affecting the Bakanrae-Musselman's Lake area constitutes the Secondary Plan for that area.

The Honourable Minister of Housing has referred to the Ontario Municipal Board Section 4.3a.3.1 of Amendment No. 14 which requires monitoring of the population of the Musselman's Lake area and stipulates that it shall not exceed 1,000 persons and in addition provides that if the cumulative effects of growth are recognized by contamination of the aquifer or of the lake prior to that population level being reached then no further development shall be permitted.

The land use designation shown on Schedule "A1" of Amendment No. 14 of lands on part of Plan 242 in Lot 18, Concession 8 and on part of Lot 18, Concession 8, fronting on the North Side of Connor Drive and vicinity is changed by Amendment No. 14 Schedule "A1" from Rural to Lakeside Residential and is also referred by the Honourable Minister to the Ontario Municipal Board.

By-Law 79-40 will be before the Ontario Municipal Board at the same time as Section 4.3a.3.1 and Schedule "A1" of Amendment No. 14. This by-law changes the zoning of the said lands presently zoned Transitional to permit a subdivision of 19 residential lots with a minimum area of 2,787 square metres in the Residential Rural First Density category of By-Law 72-7.

Official Plan Amendment No. 14 aforesaid including the referred section and Schedule "A1" are compatible with By-Law 79-40 and vice versa.

The Official Plan, the Amendment No. 14 and By-Laws 79-40 and 72-7 may be examined at the Town Offices, 19 Civic Avenue, Stouffville.
