Due to the interest she aroused, our chapter asked Murray Spence, Special Education Consultant, North York Board of Education, to help us understand the needs of the parent and child; the teacher and student. His fascinating and revealing presentation drew warm appreciation from everyone present. As one parent put it, "I felt I was looking at our own home and I truly began to understand the meanings of things we say to each other."

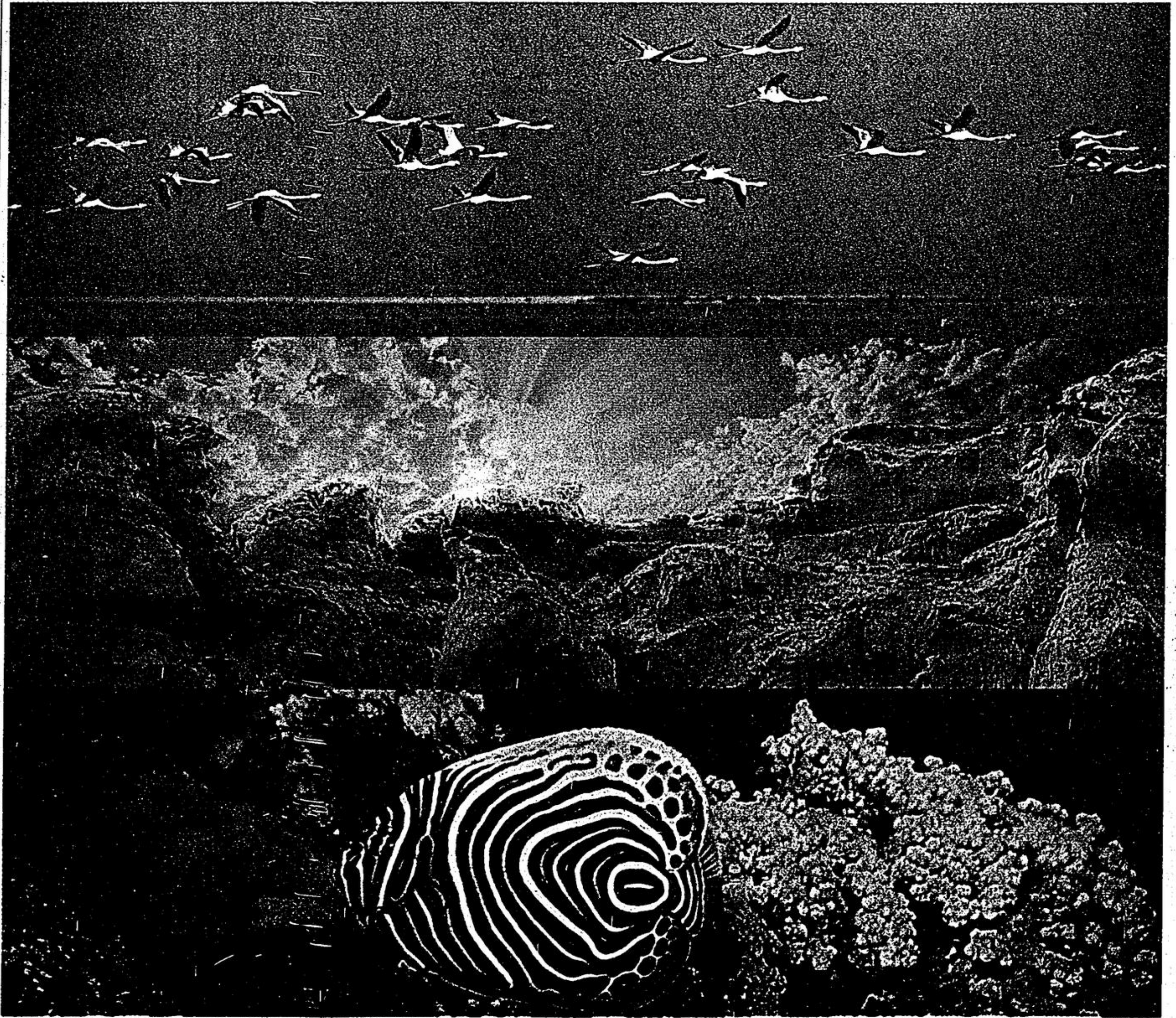
