

Give N.D.P.
a chance

To the Editor:
In about four weeks we will elect a government, like most Canadian's I would have liked it a lot better if this was not necessary. However, after six months of conservative government or rather the absence of a government, I am glad the Canadians have a second chance.

Sinclair Stevens has the advantage of having many old signs around from the last election, of course, the signs as well as the men they advertise are a bit worse for wear. A great many of his constituents are commuters who have to drive their cars to work, for lack of other transportation. So how can their M.P. support a tax based on the amount of gasoline used without any regard to the ability to pay? What makes this tax even more absurd is the fact that it is being used to subsidise mortgage payments, again without regards to income. This means tax collected from a person earning minimum wage can be used to support the mortgage payments of a \$50,000.00 a year executive driving a Company car to work tax free. A large number of voters in this riding are farmers, traditionally those people are conservative. Some where in history Conservative government must have favored the farmer, but certainly not in recent history. I was a dairy farmer in Eastern Ontario during the Diefenbaker era, farmers out west could not sell their grain. Silos were full and grain was stored in big piles right in the field, for lack of proper storage.

Millions of pounds of butter were going rancid in Montreal because there was no market for it. Imagine my surprise when I read a small article in the local paper announcing the trade of 10 million dollars worth of American farm surplus were being traded for 10 million dollars of Pig lead from B.C. Mining and Smelting.

After many letters and telephone calls I was assured this surplus farm produce would not enter Canada, but would replace Canadian products in South America and Spain.

The real interesting part was the cosy relationship between Mr. Fitzpatrick, President of B.C. Mining and Smelting and Alvin Hamilton, the Minister of Agriculture. Mr. Fitzpatrick was also President of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.

A resolution from the Chamber of Commerce was picked up by Alvin Hamilton and "ARDA" was born. ARDA was supposed to stimulate Rural Development, as far as I know some community pastures were developed in Cochrane, but it really never got started. Maybe Mr. Sinclair should look in to this. In my estimate, for every dollar put to work in the Rural Community \$500.00 were spent in Ottawa.

1.6 Billion is being spent by lobbyist in Ottawa, not counting the donation of a swimming pool at 64 Sussex or the financing of expensive memorial libraries.

The farmers are in no position to match the contributions of corporations Banks etc. Their declining numbers and traditional voting gives them very little political power, and so we remain the dumping grounds of surplus farm products. There is one way to change this pattern, if enough farmers would vote N.D.P. to swing a few ridings from the old parties to the New Democrats, they would get a lot more attention next time around.

Parts of the media and some politicians still try to scare people away from Socialism, and try to jump Social Democats in with the totalitarian kind of Socialism of Eastern Europe. Most countries in Western Europe are Social Democratic governments, including some of the most successful, like West Germany and Sweden.

When you put your X on the ballot give the New Democrats a chance.
