NOTICE TO LANDOWNERS IN THAT AREA OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF UXBRIDGE, FORMERLY KNOWN AS THE TOWNSHIP OF UXBRIDGE, AND TO LANDOWNERS ADJACENT TO THE ABOVE AREA INCLUDING THOSE IN THE FORMER TOWN OF UXBRIDGE AND WITHIN 120 METRES (400 FEET) THEREOF IN THE FORMER TOWN OF UXBRIDGE, AND IN THE FORMER TOWNSHIP OF SCOTT, AS WELL AS THOSE IN THE PRESENT TOWN OF EAST GWILLIMBURY, TOWN OF WHITCHURCH-STOUFFVILLE, TOWN OF MARKHAM, TOWN OF PICKERING, TOWN OF WHITBY, TOWNSHIP OF SCUGOG AND THE TOWNSHIP OF BROCK.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION to The Ontario Municipal Board by The Corporation of the Township of Uxbridge for approval of a by-law to regulate land use passed pursuant to Section 35 of The Planning Act.

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Uxbridge intends to apply to The Ontario Municipal Board pursuant to the provisions of Section 35 of The Planning Act for approval of By-law 79-74 passed on the 25th day of October, 1979. A copy of the by-law is furnished herewith and a note giving an explanation of the purpose and effect of the by-law and stating the lands affected thereby is also furnished herewith.

ANY PERSON INTERESTED MAY, within twenty-one (21) days after the date of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the clerk of the Township of Uxbridge notice of objection to approval of the said by-law or part thereof giving details of all or the portion of the by-law to which you object and detailed reasons therefor, and shall indicate that if a hearing is held the objector or an agent will attend at the hearing to support the objection.

ANY PERSON wishing to support the application for approval of the by-law may within twenty-one (21) days after the date of this notice send by registered mail or deliver to the clerk of the Township of Uxbridge notice of his support of approval of the said by-law together with a request for notice of any hearing that may be held giving also the name and address to which such notice should be given.

THE ONTARIO MUNICIPAL BOARD may approve of the said by-law but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objection to the by-law will be considered. Notice of any hearing that may be held will be given only to persons who have filed an objection or notice of support and who have left with or delivered to the clerk undersigned, the address to which notice of hearing is to be sent and, similarly, to any person who has filed a request for a change in the provisions of the by-law.

THE LAST DATE FOR FILING OBJECTIONS will be February 27th, 1980.

BY-LAW NO. 79-74

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF UXBRIDGE

being a by-law under the provisions of Section 35 of The Planning Act, R.S.O., 1970, c. 349, to repeal Restricted Area By-law No. 77-47 with respect to the area comprising the former Corporation of the Township of Uxbridge.

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Uxbridge previously enacted Restricted Area By-law No. 77-47 with respect to the area comprising the former Corporation of the Township of Uxbridge but has not as yet received the required approval from the Ontario Municipal Board thereto and now deems it advisable to repeal the by-law.

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Uxbridge hereby enacts as follows:

1. That Restricted Area By-law No. 77-47 passed on September 15, 1977 is hereby repealed, saving and excepting therefrom all of the Schedules including Key Maps 1, 2, and 3 and the Index Map attached to said By-law No. 77-47 which are hereby confirmed.
2. That Restricted Area By-law No. 1517 as amended by Restricted Area By-law No. 77-47 and as otherwise amended is hereby amended to give effect to the provisions of this by-law but said Restricted Area By-law No. 1517 as amended as aforesaid shall in all other respects remain in full force and effect save as the same may be otherwise amended or hereinafter dealt with.
3. That this by-law shall come into force on the date it is passed by the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Uxbridge subject to receiving the approval of the Ontario Municipal Board.

THIS BY-LAW given its first, second and third readings and finally passed this 25th day of October, 1979.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

To By-law Number 79-74 passed by the Corporation of The Township of Uxbridge.

Lands Affected: This By-law, which amends Restricted Area By-law Number 1517, as otherwise amended, applies to the whole of the area known as the Former Corporation of the Township of Uxbridge, which now forms part of the present Corporation of the Township of Uxbridge.

Purpose & Effect: The purpose of By-law 79-74 is to repeal all of By-law Number 77-47, saving and excepting therefrom all of the zone mapping contained in the Schedules, including Key Maps 1, 2 and 3, and the Index Mapping attached to By-law Number 77-47, which are confirmed.

Present Zoning: By-law Number 1517, as amended by other By-laws, including By-law Number 77-47, provides zoning for the whole of the Former Township of Uxbridge. By-law Number 79-74 confirms the zoning set forth in By-law Number 77-47 and does not change it.

Proposed Zoning: By-law Number 79-74 confirms the zoning set forth in By-law Number 77-47.

Note: Reference should be made to the zoning maps attached to By-law Number 77-47, which are available at the Municipal Offices of the Township, 20 Bascom Street, at the Former Town of Uxbridge.

TAKE FURTHER NOTICE that the Corporation of the Township of Uxbridge intends to apply to the Ontario Municipal Board for approval to Restricted Area By-law Number 79-74; at Hearings commencing March 17, 1980 before the Board, in Uxbridge, in connection with the application by the Corporation of the Township of Uxbridge for approval to Restricted Area By-law Number 77-47; which Restricted Area By-law Number 79-74 amends. Notice of this Hearing will be given shortly, in accordance with the directions of the Ontario Municipal Board, once received, and a copy of the Appointment for Hearing will be available in the Municipal Offices.

York Region woman Overcomes adversity

YORK REGION — Every year since she was sixteen, 29 year old Tiki Papas has spent some time in hospital. Despite this she has managed to lead a full and active life.

Tiki has renal rickets (a condition in which the growth of the bones is distorted by the dysfunction of the kidney.) While she was a child her bones would grow in their own way and when she was 12, and already small for her age, she stopped growing completely. Her joints are all an inch or two

apart and she has brittle bones which can be broken by the slightest fall. In addition to her disability, she recently discovered she has inherited a heart problem.

Tiki has never given in to self-pity. She describes herself as "a fighter with the will to survive." Her attitude has so impressed professionals that she has often been asked to talk to other disabled people, especially those newly handicapped through accidents, and help them accept their disabilities. She frequently counsels such people through the local Health Information Centre and at various hospitals during her stay as a patient. She tries to encourage the people she counsels to talk about their problems. If they find this difficult to do, Tiki first talks about her own disabilities and the problems she has encountered.

She lives on a disability pension with her mother and her brother and his wife and their two children. Although she cannot work (she lives on a disability pension) she keeps very busy. When she is not counselling other disabled people she looks after her nieces. She enjoys cooking and embroidery and takes swimming lessons at the Vaughan Woodbridge Pool.

At school Tiki was an achiever and hoped that her disability would not prevent her from having a career. She had a lot of friends and found the other students accepted her disability. She always encouraged them to ask her questions about her condition rather than allowing them to develop a curiosity or fear which could have stood in the way of a good friendship.

During her last year at high school (Yorkdale Secondary in Toronto) Tiki was elected both top prefect and Citizen of the Year. (The Citizen of the Year Award was for general helpfulness to students and other teachers.)

Tiki did not think her disability would prevent her from having a career. Before she left school she was allowed to decide where she would like to be employed for a few months as part of the school's work experience program. She chose the Hospital for Sick Children where she had been receiving treatment since she came to Canada from Europe as a child.

She thoroughly enjoyed working in the office at the hospital and became interested in a career in social work, preferably working with children.

However, this was not to be. No sooner had she finished her assignment than she had to go into hospital for her first major operation. She was in bed for five months and as soon as she started walking again she fell and fractured her knee. The knee cap eventually had to be removed. This was also the year that Tiki's father, whom she adored, died of a heart attack.

Tiki's operations over the years have included having her legs straightened and insertion of plastic joints. She constantly needs treatment for broken bones, kidney stones (to which she is prone) and the low level of calcium in her body. Her on-going need for medical treatment plus her constant fatigue necessitated her giving up any plans for a career.

Throughout her childhood and early adulthood Tiki, who had received no medical treatment for her condition before coming to Canada at the age of nine, saw specialists at the Hospital for Sick Children. She now receives regular treatment at Toronto General Hospital.

Tiki's regular visits to the General were a problem for the family. Tiki's disability prevents her from taking public transportation and neither she nor her mother (the only family members at home during the day) drive a car. So the only way for her to get to and from the hospital was for her brother to take time off work to drive her there and back.

When the Ontario March of Dimes heard about Tiki's problem they agreed to pay for a taxi to transport her to and from the hospital so she could keep her appointments without inconveniencing her family.

Helping disabled adults in the community through assistance with transportation is just one of the ways in which the Ontario March of Dimes serves the handicapped community.

The organization also offers camping holidays, training and employment opportunities, help to community groups of handicapped individuals; wheelchairs and other walking aids and funding of medical research.
