Canada's Wonderland opens in spring of '81

YORK REGION - It's being described as Canada's Wonderland or Disneyland of the North.

The location is a 320 acre site south of Major MacKenzie Drive between Jane Street and Hwy. 400 at Maple---an

amusement park with much the same flavor as the Disney ventures in California and Florida.

Like its American counterparts, the emphasis will be on family entertainment with five major theme areas for the

family to explore. The most impressive will be International Street. It will have a spectacular fountain in the centre with jets that shape and reform the water in a pre-determined program. The avenue will lead to a 150 foot high man-made mountain containing a version of Victoria Falls in South Africa, 100 feet wide and 60 feet high.

According to Bob Smith, project will be substantially completed this summer and opened to the public by the spring of 1981.
