Fire survey
in Town

STOUFFVILLE — At the request of Town Council, the Fire Marshal will conduct a municipal fire protection survey beginning Feb. 25.

The terms of reference for the study will be to review the existing municipal fire prevention and fire protection facilities to determine what changes, if any, should be considered in order to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the department.

It will include a review of the organization, methods, practices, manpower, apparatus, equipment, communications and fire stations of the municipality; fire prevention and other appropriate bylaws; water supply for fire fighting purposes; and traffic conditions which may affect Fire Department operations.

The survey will be completed by April 28.

Registrations received on or after May 1st will be sequenced and the date of registration will be the criteria used to determine which pupils may be required to attend another school unless there are sufficient volunteers to do so.
