

SDSS skier wins slalom

It has been a very successful year for the Alpine ski teams of Stouffville District Secondary School. The girls' team, consisting of Jane Huxtable, Peggy

McBride, Cathy Reid, Linda Frisby and Pam Frisby placed second at the York County meet, held at Bethany ski club on January 30. The boys' team consisting of Tom

Morgan, Dave Dart, Craig Toews, Greg Murphy and Norm Storimans placed first at this meet.

On February 11, the teams travelled to Collingwood for the Georgian Bay meet. The girls managed an eighth place finish against some really tough competition from the northern schools. In the best showing ever for a team from York County, the Stouffville boys placed second; this meant that they advanced to the All Ontario Alpine Ski Championships.

The All Ontario meet, a two day affair, was held on February 21 and 22 at Georgia Peaks resort in Collingwood. One hundred and four boys from 26 schools across the province were entered.

The first day was the Giant Slalom event. The course, almost a mile long, was extremely difficult. Tom Morgan had the fourth best time, but was disqualified by a questionable call on the part of a gatekeeper. As a result the team finished in fourteenth place.

The Slalom event was held the following day, and it was indeed sweet revenge for Tom Morgan

and his teammates: Tom posted the fastest time in the first run, and held off strong challenges by Collingwood and North Toronto in the second run, to take first place in the slalom event. This win, along with a fine performance by his teammates, gave Stouffville a fourth place finish overall.

When the results for the two days events were combined, the Stouffville team finished eighth overall out of the 26 schools who entered from across Ontario; truly an exceptional performance from a group of fine dedicated skiers.
