The first show was called "Minstrel Mania". The first producer-director was Peggy Topping. Ron Mercer took charge of a 34-voice chorus and Molly Mumford directed seven dancers through their routines. The End Men were Ted Topping, Ron Neale, Albert Smalley, Lorne Bowdway, Bill Dedlow, Glen Hunter, and Bud Sanderson as "Mr. Interlocuter". Music for the show was provided by Cec Hendricks, Jim Rehill and Jerry Waite. A total of \$800 was donated to Thornhaven School for Retarded Children. The same format continued for three years. To celebrate Music Mania's 20th anniversary, a souvenir book is being published and should be available next week. Tickets for this year's event are now on sale at Card's Hardware. On April 25 (after the show), former members are invited to participate in a cake and coffee party and reminisce on twenty years of success.
