Purchase manse

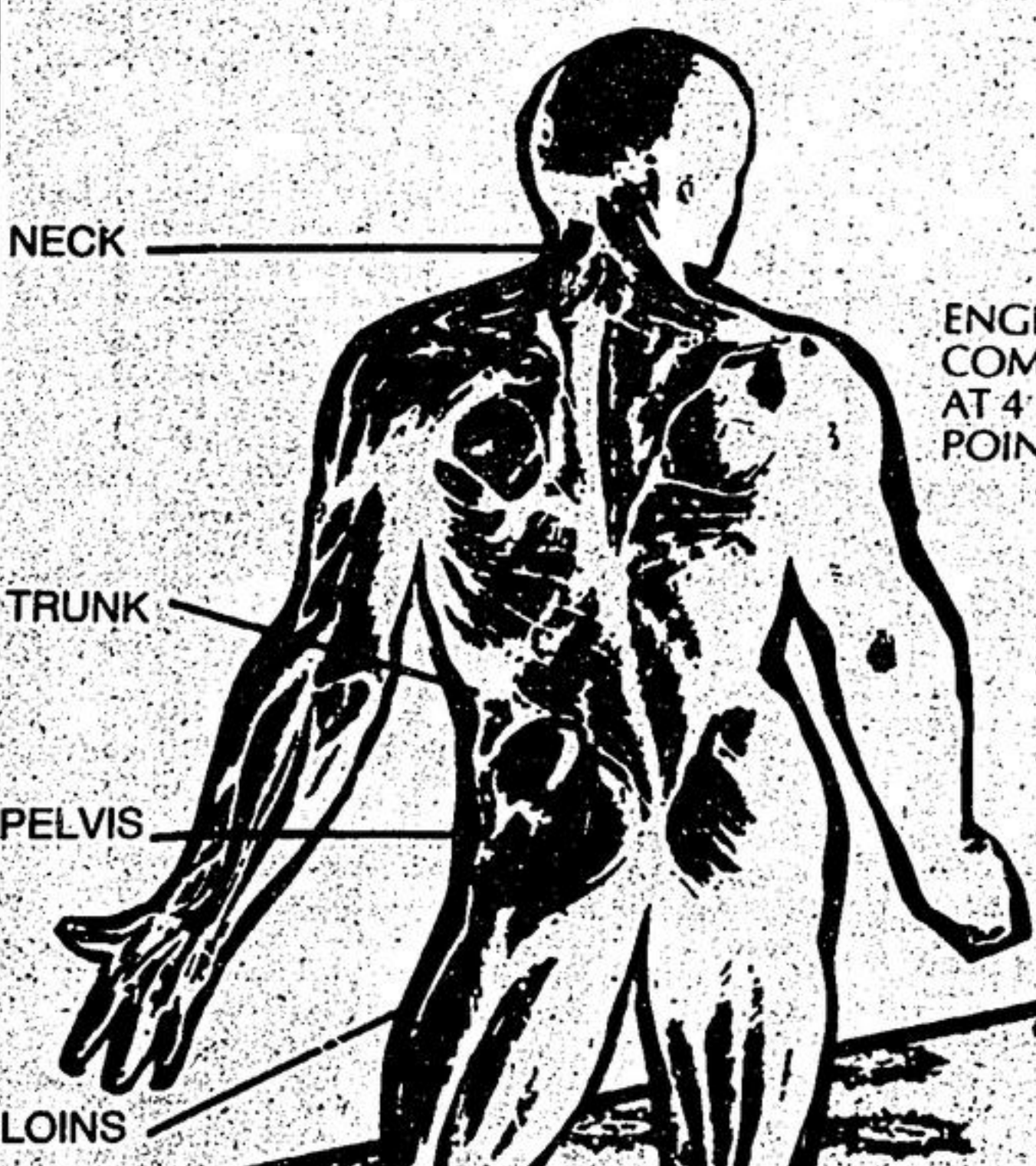

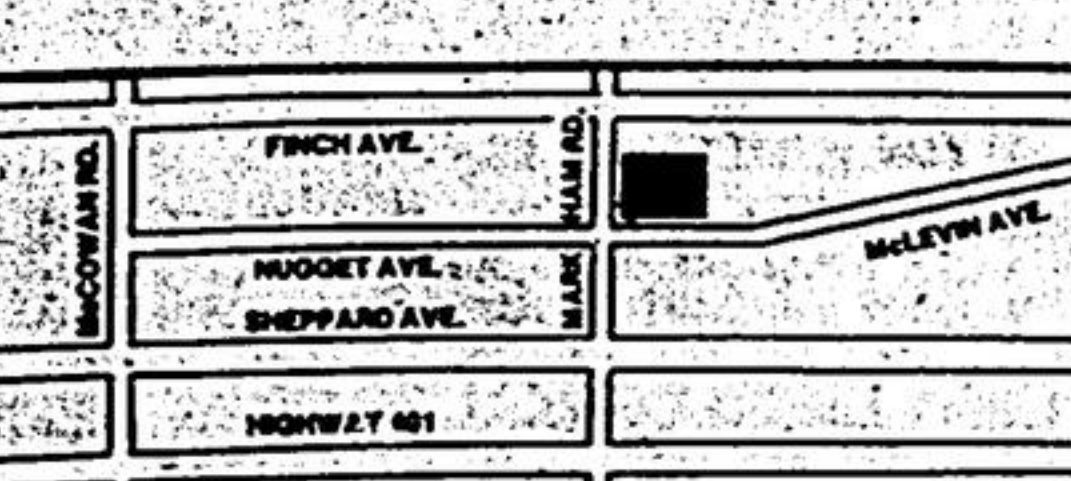

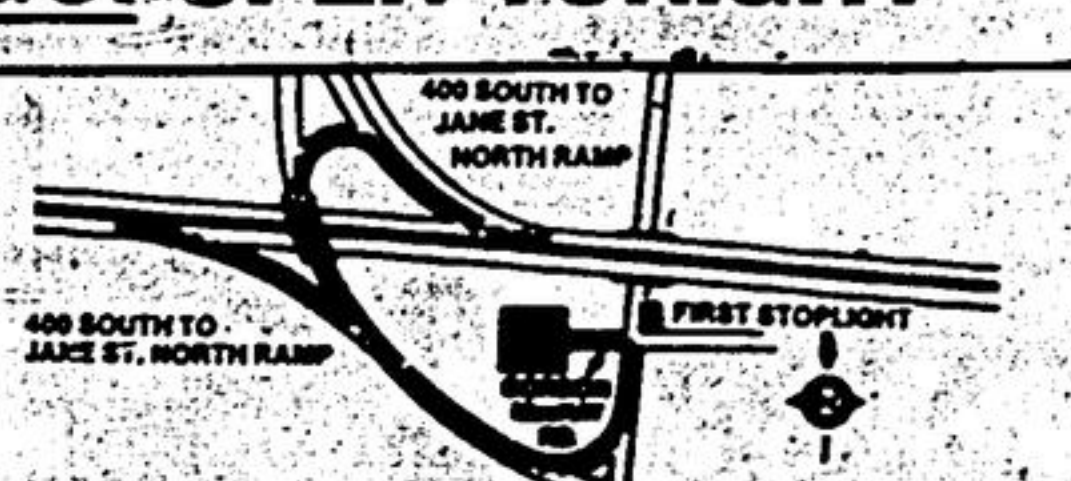
