

Expropriate corner site

MARKHAM — A recommendation will be placed before Regional Council, calling for the expropriation of 200 square feet of land belonging to John and Betty McLean on the north-west corner of McCowan Road and 17th Avenue.

The decision follows a hearing, April 1 at Newmarket in which reasons for not proceeding with the plan were outlined in full.

The stipulated price is \$500.

Ron Moran, a regional representative

for the Town of Markham said the owners can register their disapproval when the issue comes before Council this month or they can file an appeal with the compensation court.

Mr. Moran explained that no part of the new road surface would infringe on the McLean land. "It's for daylighting purposes only," he said.

Plan Farm Fair

UXBRIDGE — Because of numerous requests for tours at Lloyd Wilson's Sales Arena, this month, for the first time ever there will be a Farm Fair.
