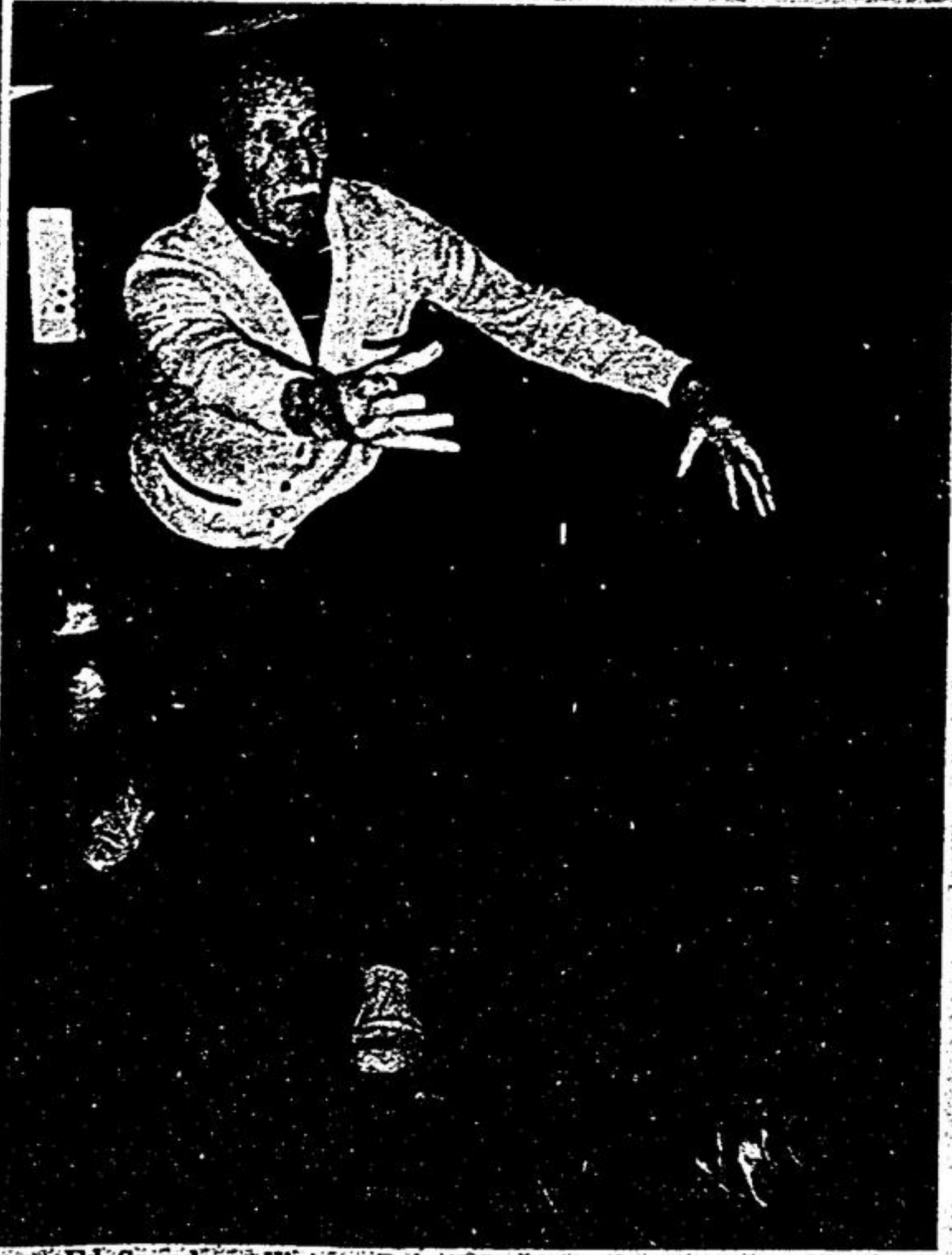


"The Senators" Senior strikers

To open children's market

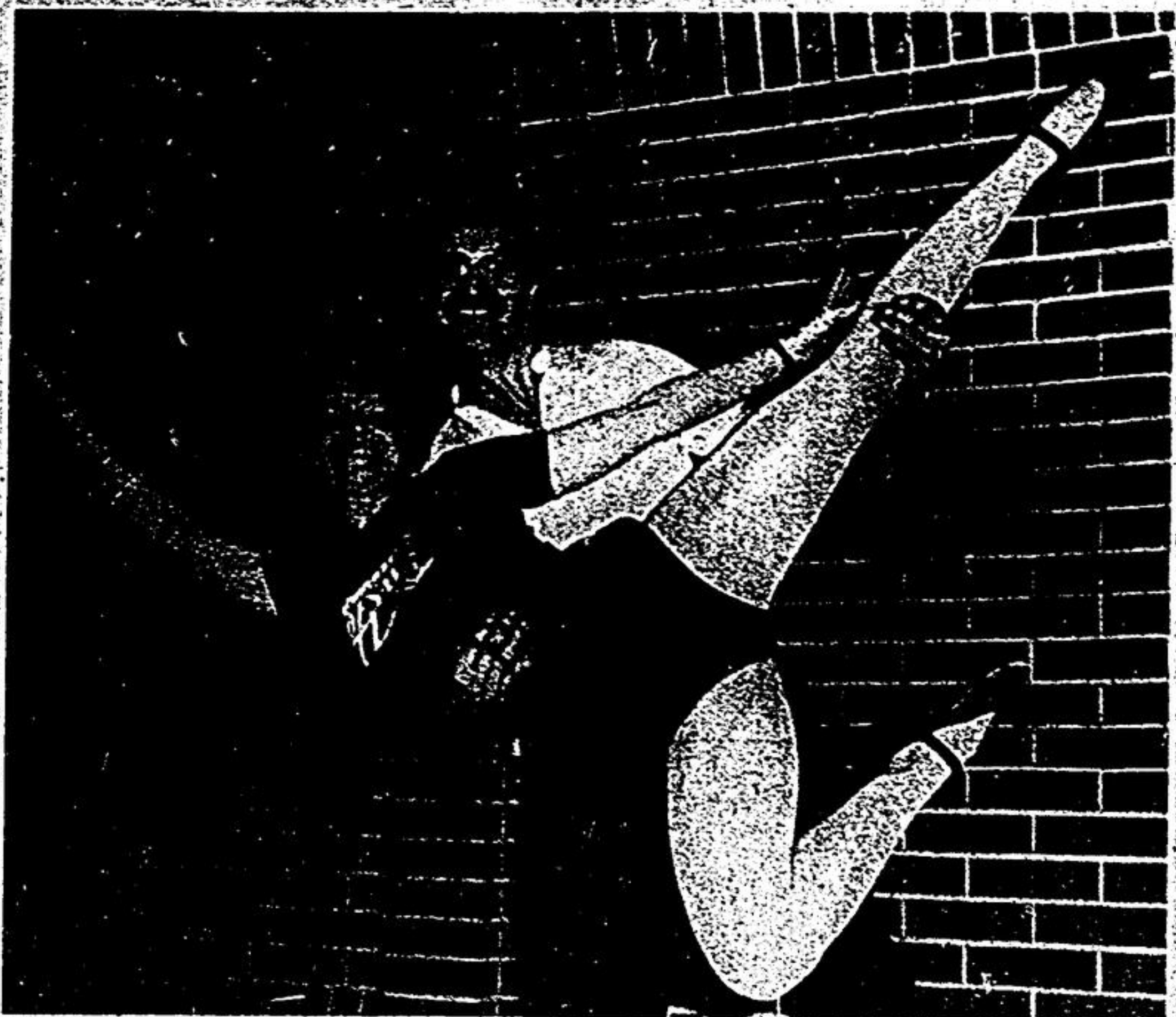
