STOUFFVILLE — Travelling to England's no longer an uncommon experience. It's simpler though, when a little bit of England comes to Stouffville. Eighteen year old Suzanne How (she'll be 19, May 12) lives at 64 Stuart Street. Before coming to Canada, she resided at Plumstead, a suburb of London.

Although Suzanne retains her English accent, she claims it's not as pronounced as before, kind of "half way", she says.

She still corresponds with a girlfriend "back home" and hopes to see her again if ever she returns for a visit.

Suzanne attended a co-ed boarding school in England and enjoyed it. The students were required to wear uniforms, a practice she readily accepted. "But I don't think they'd go for it here," she suggested, with reference to Stouffville High.

A Grade 12 graduate, Suzanne is currently enrolled in a bank teller's training course at Century Business Academy, Toronto. She comes by this interest honestly. Her mother's a member on the staff at the Toronto - Dominion Branch in Stouffville.

friends and one to South Carolina with her family. Suzanne echoes the sentiments of many Stouffville teens when she claims there are too few activities for young people in town, par-

the Royal Canadian Legion. Bob is the founder of the Barrie and District Association for the Physically Disabled. He was also the main person

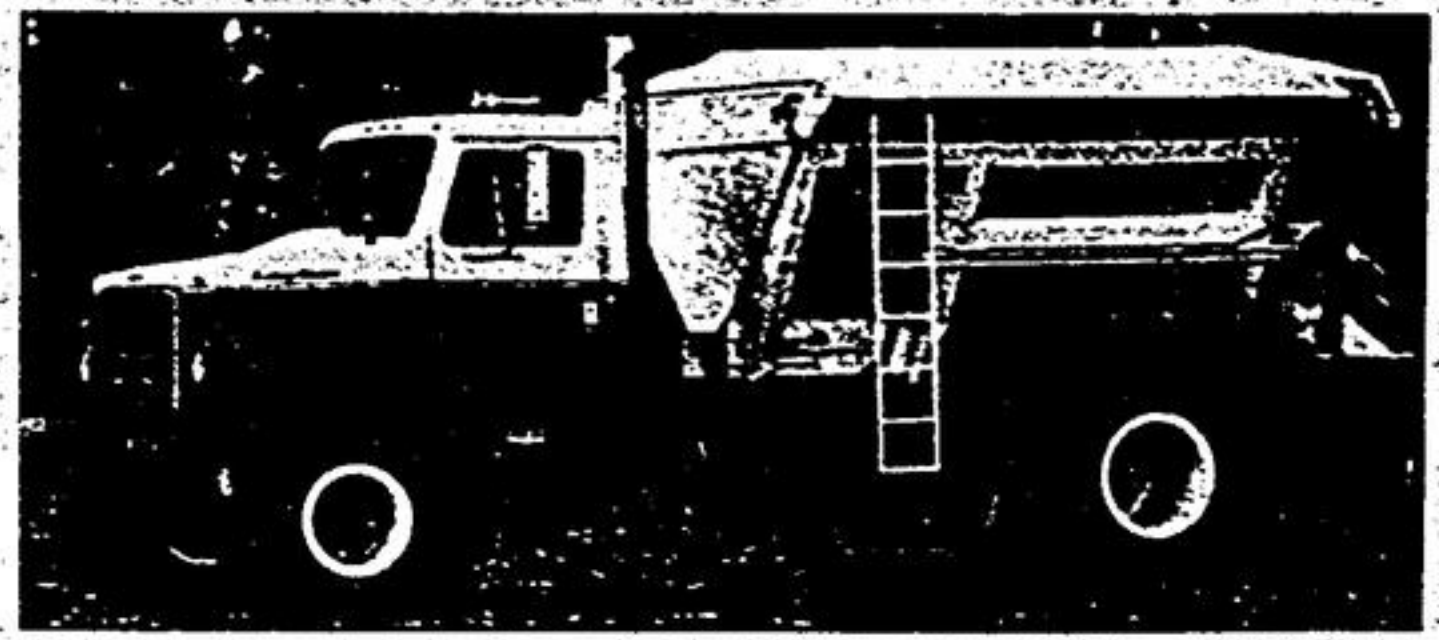
responsible for a transit service, now utilized by the physically handicapped. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Claude Kerr of Ringwood.

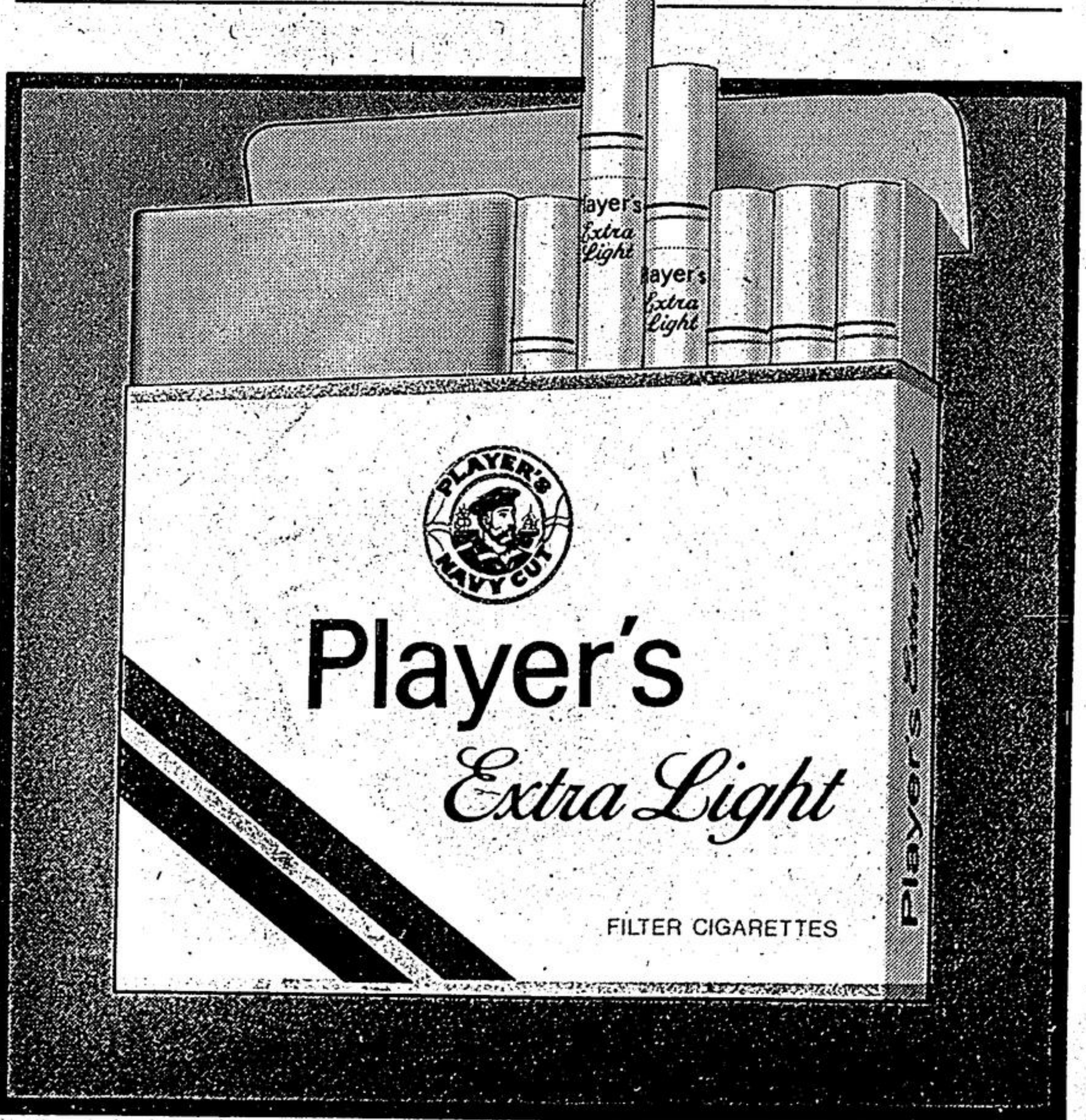

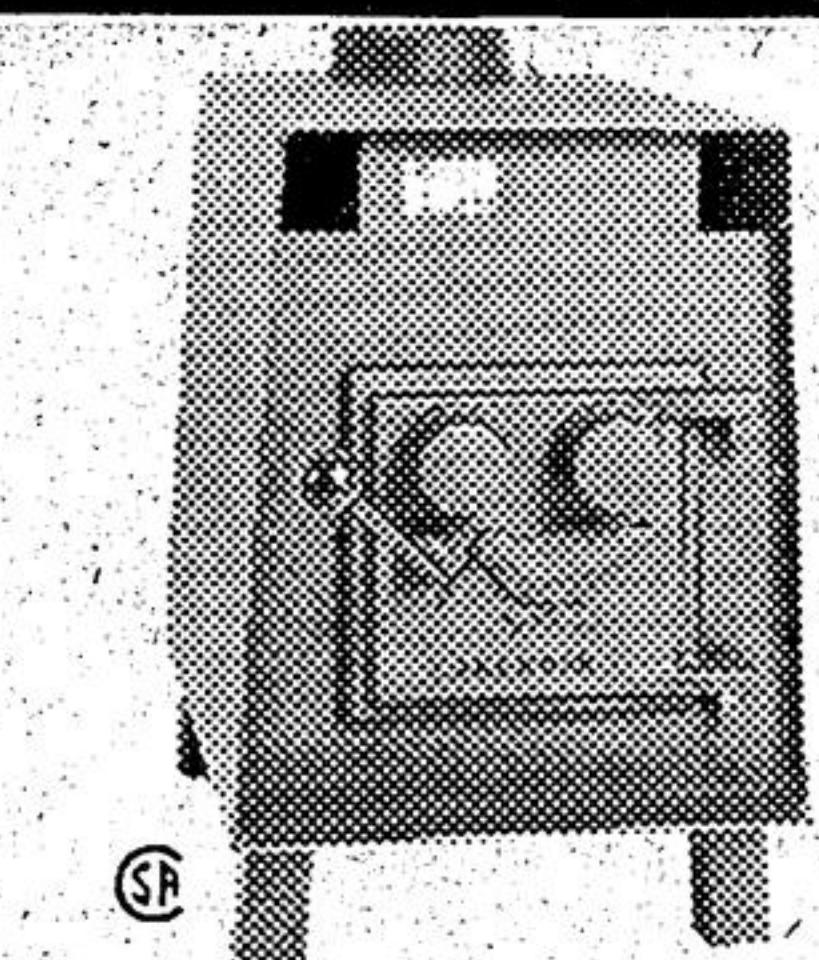

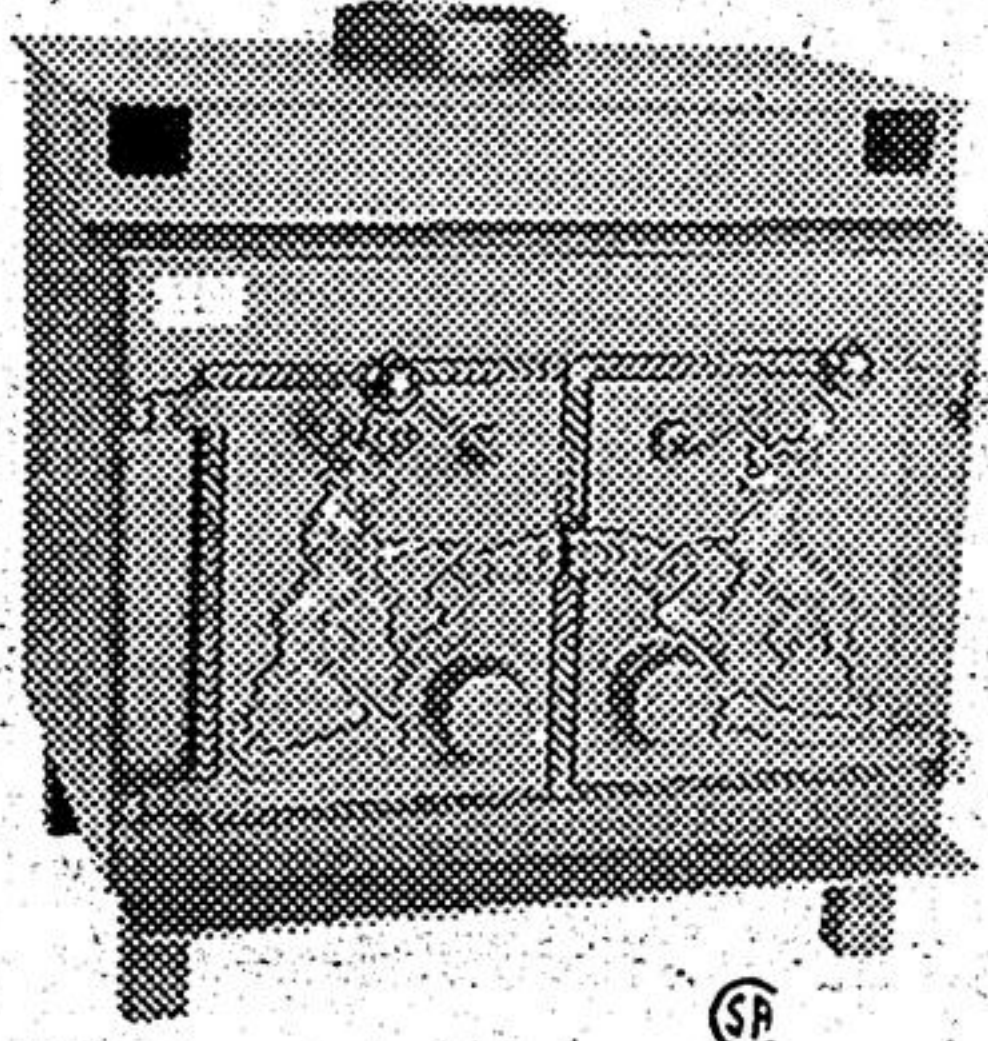
