STOUFFVILLE — The Stouffville Family Life Centre is celebrating "Family Unity Month" in May.

Several programs are planned including a seminar on "Stages of Marriage" in the United Church on Wed., May 21.

The keynote speaker will be Dr. Ronald Myhr, psychologist with the Dept. of Applied Psychology at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education, Toronto.

Dr. Myhr lives at Clarendon where he has a private practice in psychology limited to marital and relationship therapy, personal counselling and psychotherapy. Time of the seminar is 8 p.m.

On Wed., May 22, a workshop entitled "Communications in the Family" will be held at 8 p.m., in St. James Presbyterian Church.

Sylvia Rosenberg, Director of the Stouffville Family Life Centre will focus attention on specific parenting skills and communication concepts within the family.

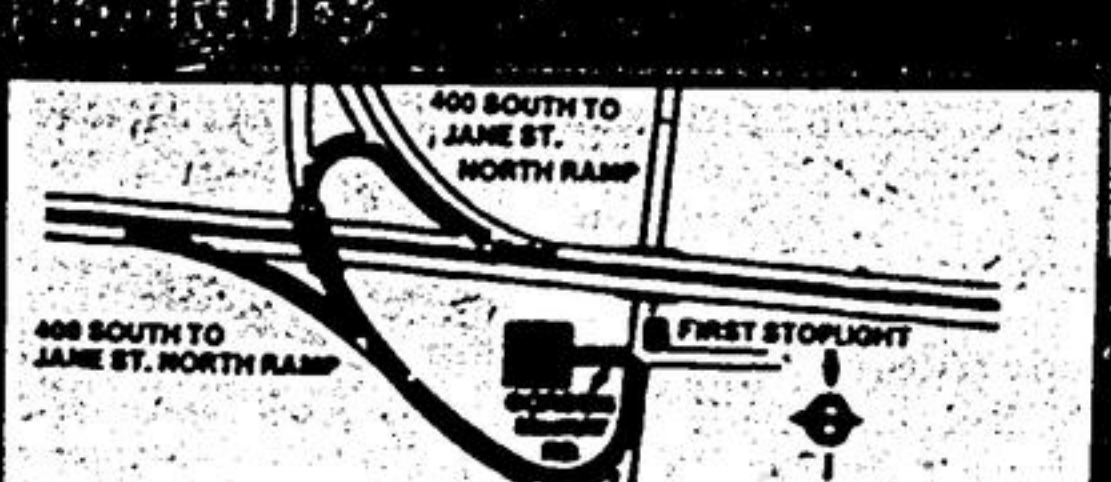
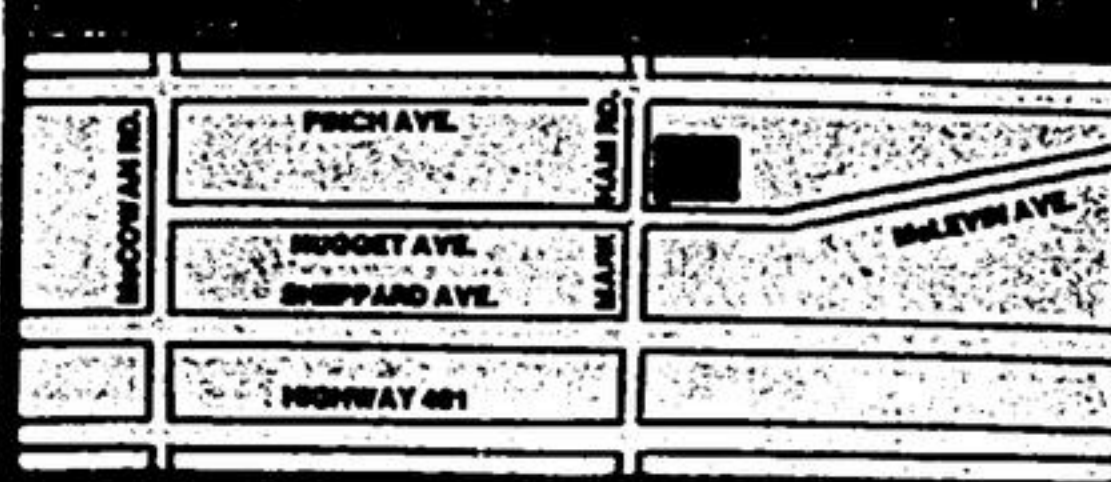
