Inexpensive Dining

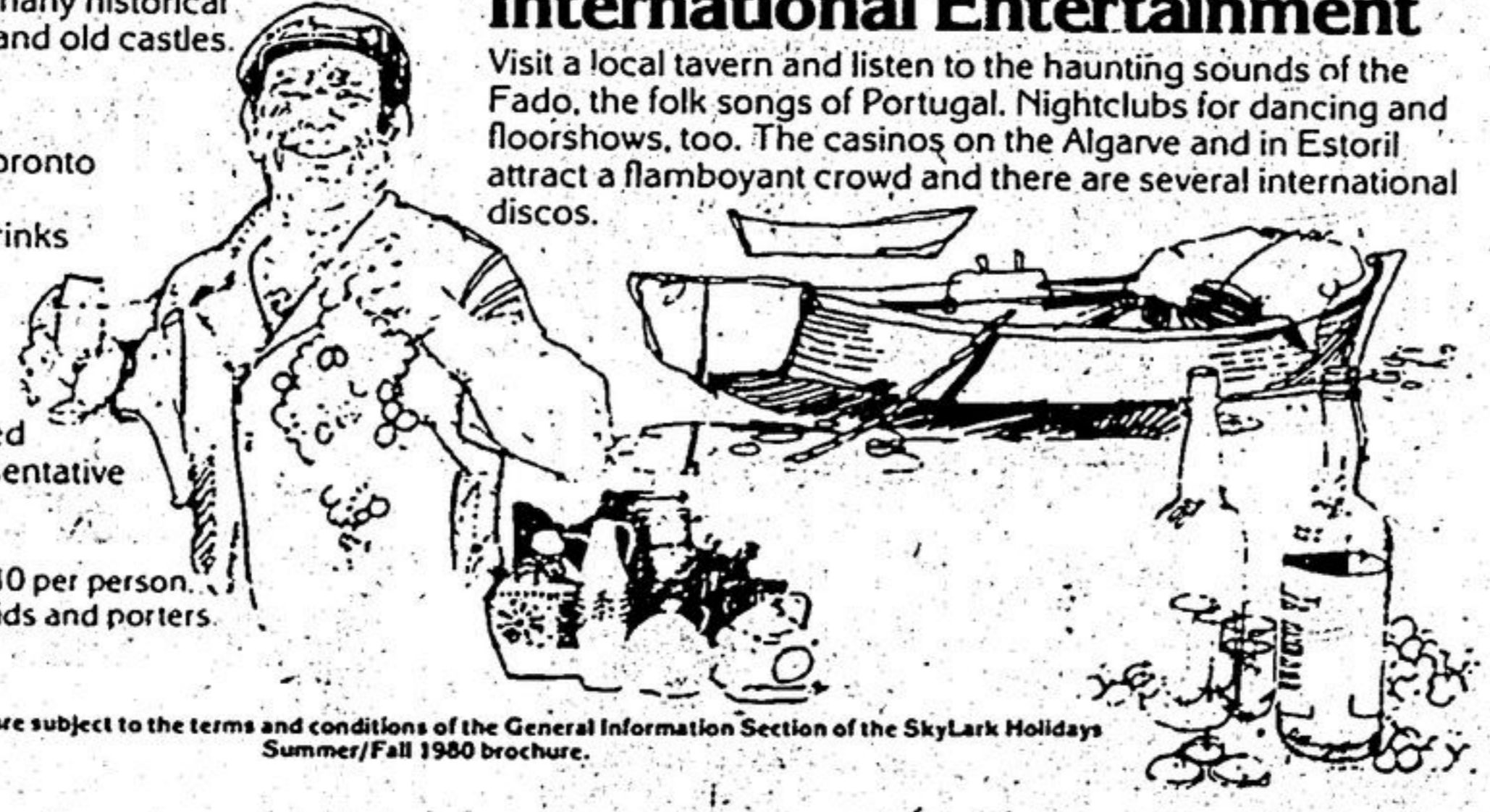
