

Watson subdivision proposed in 1955

What news events were subjects of sidewalk conversations, twenty-five years ago? To find out, The Tribune's editor hauled out the file of April-May, 1955 and discovered the following stories:

A large subdivision comprising 53 lots was announced for Cedric Watson's property east of the Tenth Line in Stouffville. An entrance to the proposed development would lead from Main Street, with outlets available for further expansion.

Stouffville Dist. High School held its Commencement Exercises. Eleven honor graduates received diplomas including - Audrey Brown, Margaret Burkholder, Graham Frisby, Barbara Hissey, Gloria Hood, Betty Lou Keffer, Isobel Mc-

Creight, Phyllis Paisley, Murray Pipher, June Smith, Patricia Smith, Glenn Thompson and Margaret White. The valedictorian was June Smith.

Claremont Baptist Church was filled to capacity for the dedication of a new \$2,250 Hammond electric organ, a gift to the congregation from the late Sarah Elizabeth Evans. The pastor, Rev. George Davison, was assisted in the service by Rev. Harold Lackey of the Claremont United

Church. Donald Jackson, novice and junior champion of the Oshawa Figure Skating Club was advertised at the headliner for Stouffville's Springtime Ice Revue along with Wanda Beasley and the Robb

sisters, Christine, Myrna and Joanne from Markham. Lorae Schell of Stouffville and Ken Ogden of Ballantrae reached the semi-finals in an all-Canada judo competition held in Toronto.

Hugh Baird of Blackwater and Norm Jarvis of Markham won first and second respectively in plowing competitions at Chilliwack, B.C. Village Council members voted to increase their annual stipend to \$150. Reeve

Elmer Daniels said Stouffville members were the lowest paid of any councillors in Ontario. Records showed a total of 28 meetings during 1954. The sale was reported of Markham Sand and Gravel Company, owned by Harold Boyington and

Murray Little of Markham to Miller Paving Company. The Claremont Legion Branch presented their padre, Rev. George Davison, with a silver tea service, prior to his leaving the community. Participants in the ceremony included President Todd along with Bill Hicks, Gordon Benson and Randy Carruthers.

John Mathewson's Carload Groceteria was selling Clark's pork and beans, two cans for 29 cents; Carnation milk, two tall tins for 27 cents; a dozen oranges for 29 cents; a 75 pound bag of potatoes, \$2.75 and bacon by the pound for 49 cents.

The Stouffville Maple Leafs won the Pee-wee House League championship in hockey. The team was coached by Barry Wilkes and included the following players - David Coppins, Ray Ward, Gary Taylor, Rick Wedsell, Bob Tweedle, Don Eddington, Peter Stover, Frank King, Gary Brown, Jim Malloy, Larry McMullen, Brian Wilkes, Roger Stover, Keith Stewart, Buster Hogan and Barry McLean.

A morning fire destroyed a driving shed on the farm of Arthur Paisley, 7th Concession of Whitchurch. The loss included two tractors, two automobiles and a quantity of seed grain. Cause of the blaze was attributed to lightning.

Three girls from area schools, had the honor of singing in the all-Ontario Elementary School Choir at a concert in Eaton Auditorium. The students included - Claudia Brillinger, Grade 7, Stouffville Public School; Joan Oldham, Grade 7, Ringwood Public School and Kathleen Richardson, Grade 8, at S.S. No. 8, East Gwillimbury. The girls' music supervisor was Mona Armstrong of Zephyr.

Roy Grove's store at Ringwood was purchased by Ken Phillips, former manager of the Dominion Store in Stouffville. Previous owners were A.W. Lehman and Joseph M. Grove.

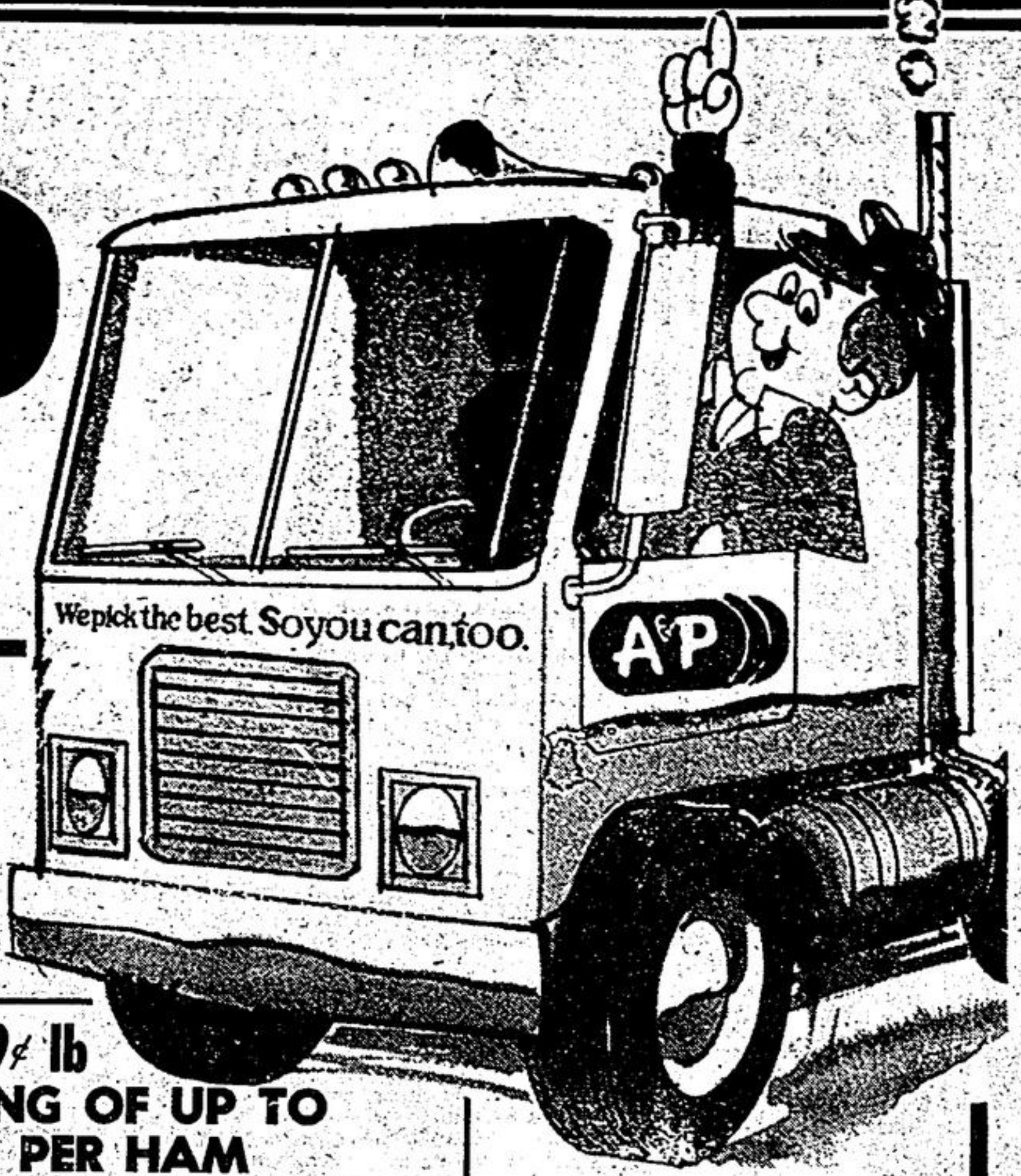
