STOUFFVILLE — Doug Feasby of Stouffville, playing with the Concordia 'Stingers' of Montreal, was named All-Canadian at the annual University National Championships in Regina, Saskatchewan.

Feasby broke all Concordia records for points this past hockey season, counting 40 goals and collecting 66 assists in 42 games. He also led the Quebec Conference in scoring and was the unanimous choice for league all-star honors.

In post-season play, Feasby led the 'Stingers' to the first-ever British Challenge Cup Championship in Dundee, Scotland. He fired six goals in three victories over the British Nationals, Denmark and the Dutch Olympic team.
