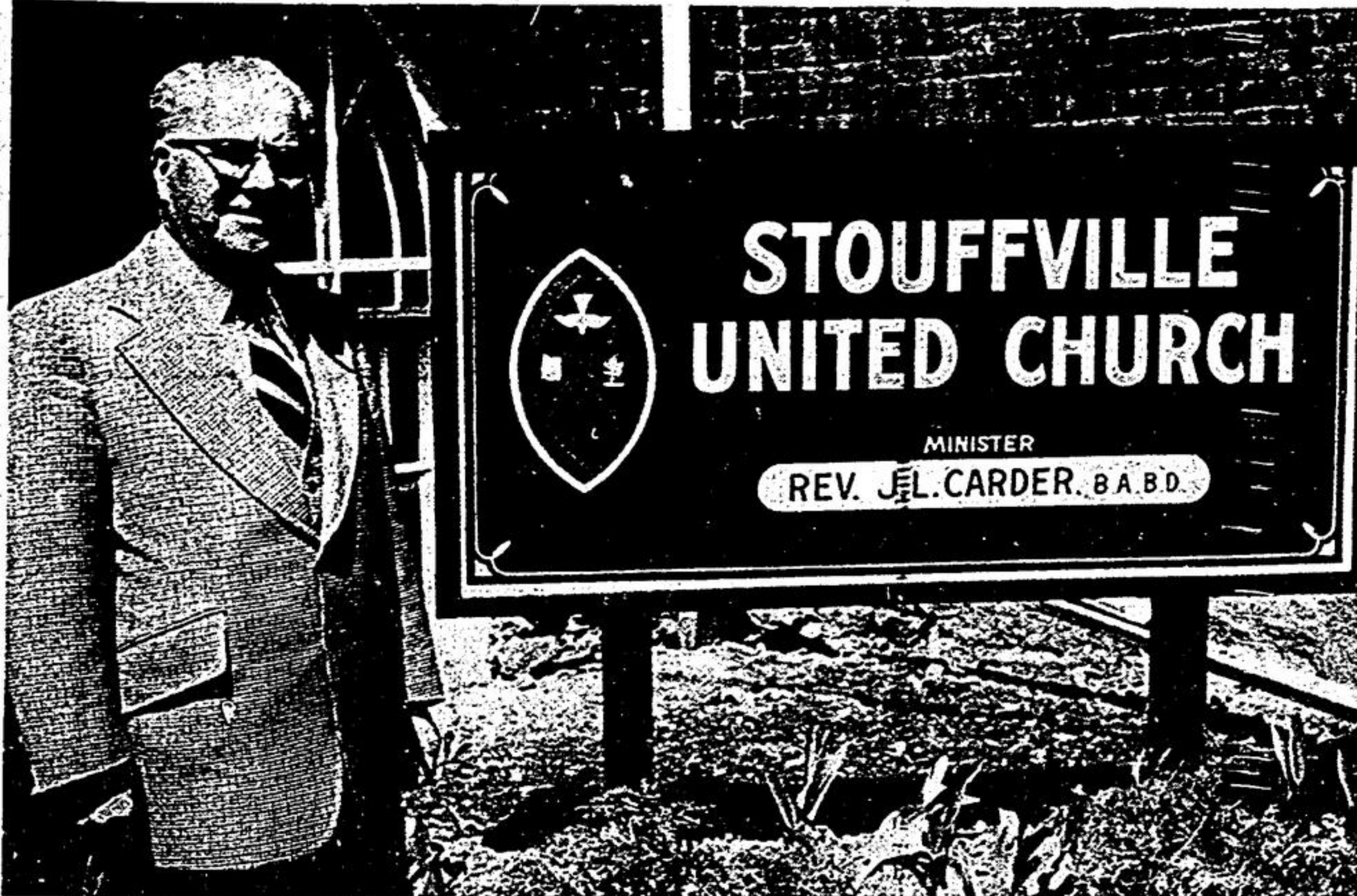

Pastor says farewell

"It's been a wonderful experience here. I love Stouffville. It's a fine place in which to live".

Few, if any, will disagree with Rev. Jim Carder, minister for the past twelve years at Stouffville United Church. All will agree that, because of him, the town is indeed "a better place" in which to live. Rev. Carder will preside over his farewell service, Sunday.

Often referred to as Stouffville's "visiting pastor", it's been Jim's firm belief that you can't preach to people you don't know and enter the ministry, he to know people by merely shaking their hands on Sunday mornings.

For this reason, he's made a practice of \$50, he paid his board over his nursing homes, private homes and hospitals on a regular basis. "Senior citizens appreciate knowing they haven't been forgotten. I consider this a minister's responsibility", he says.

Over the years, he's been considered as much a part of the personnel at Parkview, as the regular staff. "Often I suggested to Joe (Nighswander), he set me up with a room and a bed," he joked.

A native of Leemington, Rev. Carder has never lost touch with his "old home town" or his three brothers and three sisters. Annually, they get together for a family reunion. Before entering the ministry, he was principal of a one-room school with eight grades and sixty-four students. Out of a salary and saved enough to go on to university. He attended at the University of Western Ontario, London; Victoria College and Emmanuel College, University of Toronto.

Over a period of thirty-eight years, he's had five pastoral charges including Hearst (1942); Barrie (1947); Sudbury (1951); Toronto (1956) and Stouffville from 1968. He and wife Genevieve will continue to live here. Mrs. Carder, an extremely talented lady, is involved in leadership development with the United Church of Canada. Many of her informative articles have been published in The Observer.

"We've been partners in every sense of the word," says Jim appreciatively.

He speaks with pride of their family of four,

including three sons, William of Scarborough, Gordon and Bob in Markham; one daughter, Ruth, Toronto and four grandchildren.

Jim admits he's the kind of person who finds it difficult to "slow down" even on the advice of his doctor. Fourteen working hours a day are not uncommon. "When the phone rings, you must respond," he says. On a number of occasions, he's had as many as three funerals on a single weekend not to speak of other commitments. He's tried to keep Monday's "free", but even this hasn't always been possible.

Despite the demands on his time, he wouldn't have changed a thing. "Never once have I regretted the decision, it's been a very fulfilling kind of work with many bonuses".

Rev. Carder has nothing but affectionate words for his "flock". "They've been a very responsive congregation," he says.

Vivacious sr. citizen

How does one grow old gracefully?

Whatever the secret, Mrs. George Leary of Parkview Home, Rupert Avenue, has the formula. She's the most vivacious senior citizen one could ever meet.

A Parkview resident since 1974, she has nothing but kind words for everyone employed there. "It's a good place," she says, "with a wonderful staff".

Born Ida Foote, Oct. 11, 1885, she'll celebrate her 96th birthday this fall.

A keen memory coupled with a pleasant personality makes her a joy to be around. "I've a lot to be thankful for," she says.

A native of Bethesda, she attended the little one-room school there, walking

about a mile and a half there and back each day. "When the weather was really bad, I always hated to stay home because I knew I'd miss a lot of fun". Isaac Pike was the teacher a good many years.

The Bethesda and Stouffville Telephone Company actually had an office in the community but originally, there were only about five homes accorded this "luxury". Hers

wasn't one of them, not until later. It really didn't matter, because it was difficult to get a word in edgeways anyway, she remembers, so popular was the service. Their house was lighted by lamps.

Later, her family moved to Bethesda "proper". She attended the Methodist Church, a building that was also shared by the Mennonites.

In 1933, she and her husband took up residence in Gormley. George Leary served many years on Whitchurch Twp. Council, including the office of reeve. It was through his foresight that what is now the Stouffville-Gormley Road, was extended through to Yonge Street. York County Council met in a

building on Adelaide Street, Toronto.

Ida "lived" with politics and retains an interest in it even today.

After leaving Gormley in 1953, she lived in Aurora for a time, then to Parkview in 1974.

She enjoys carpet bowling in the Home's recreation centre. She also looks forward to visits from "reader" Isabel Nigh. "She's wonderful," she says, describing how she "makes the characters come alive".

June 15 to 21 is Senior Citizen's Week in Whitchurch-Stouffville. If the Town was to select a "queen" to mark the occasion, Ida Leary would be a definite candidate.

Ida Leary was a resident of Parkview Home, Rupert Avenue, Stouffville, Ont., for many years. She is a former reeve and served on the Whitchurch Twp. Council. She is a member of the Stouffville Telephone Company and the Methodist Church.
