Common goals achieved

STOUFFVILLE — At precisely the time Rev. Philip Poole was ready to make a move, so was the congregation of Christ Church Anglican in Stouffville. For both parties, it was as if the union had been planned. "I'm excited by it all," he says, "it's all new but not brand new".

Rev. Poole was inducted into the Anglican pastoral charge here, June 15. He and his lovely wife, Karen have already moved into the church's new rectory at 558 Maystone Court. Karen is a supervisor of pre-school programs for the deaf, working out of a centre at Bayview Avenue and Lawrence, Toronto.

Born in Toronto, Philip moved to Peterborough at an early age, then back to Toronto. He's a graduate of Waterloo Lutheran University and Trinity College, University of Toronto.

The 28 year old pastor's eyes light up as he contemplates new programs he hopes can be inaugurated in the fall. He's full of praise for the enthusiasm he's found within the congregation. "I feel our church can be exciting and I'm pleased to be a part of it". He hopes to become an active member within the Stouffville Ministerial and is looking forward to attending the open-air community service in the Park, Sunday morning.

Philip speaks highly of Karen and the work she does. He even recalls the exact moment they met. "My eyes wandered from the litany and there she was, fifth row from the front, right-hand side". They were married last September.

Philip calls himself "a product of the 60's", but he's not all that happy with the period. "The pendulum was allowed to swing too far," he says, "it's time to swing back".

Before making the move to Stouffville, he was the assistant curate at Holy Trinity Anglican Church, Thornhill. "I'm excited by it all," he says. So are members of his congregation as witnessed by the "full house" attending his induction.

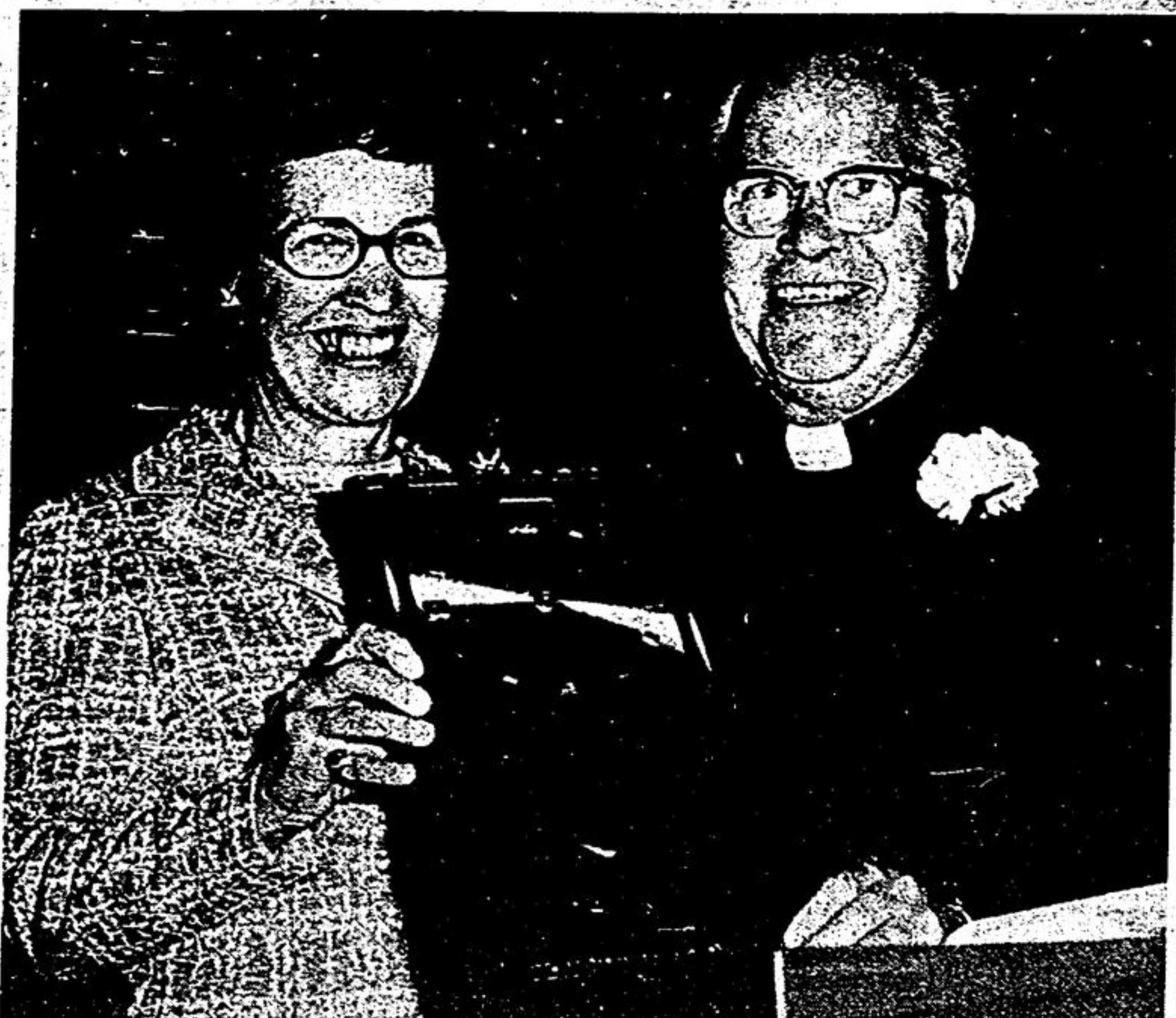

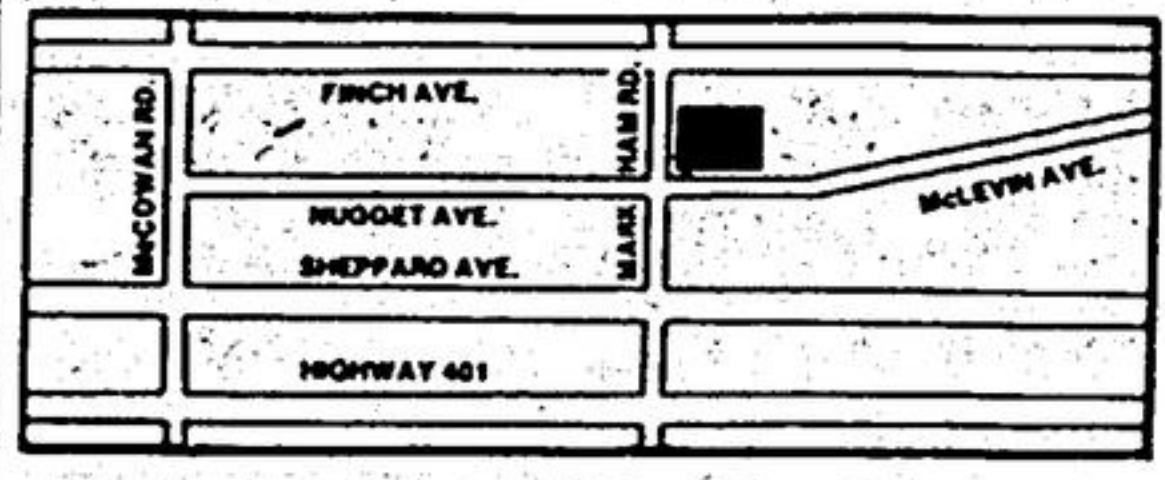

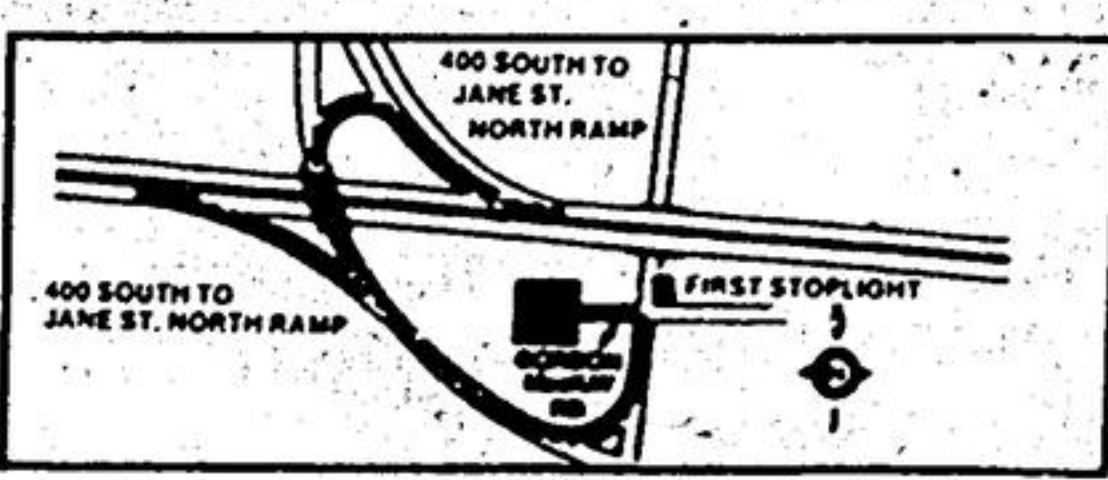

Blind Mission
Eyeglasses appreciated

WHITCHURCH — The Christian Blind Mission International has its headquarters on the Stouffville - Gormley Road, east of the 6th Concession. It is dependent on donations and gifts from the private sector and service clubs across Canada.

Last week, the Mission received 700 pairs of eyeglasses. The donor was the Lions Club of Scotland, Ont.

The glasses will be put through a grading process, then distributed to people around the world. In a country like India, where the average wage is something like fifty cents a day, these prove a blessing.

The Mission's work load is formidable. Last year, staff carried out 60,000 trachoma and 55,000 cataract operations. In the last twelve months, 55,663 blind people have regained their sight following surgery by C.N.M.I. eye doctors. Glasses were issued to 175,446 patients. Most were never paid for.

Despite this impressive record, Canadian director claims it would take up to three years to clear the backlog in India alone, even if no new cases are reported. One dollar can provide treatment to save the sight of two people.

The Mission comprises 73 third world countries with a staff of 1,240 people.
