

# Pastor blasts school system

## Not biblical christianity

STOUFFVILLE — Dr. Ken Campbell, Canada's answer to Billy Graham, brought his pro-Christian school ethics to town, Sunday, prompting mixed reaction from a "congregation" of close to eight hundred.

Dr. Campbell, president of Richmond College at Milliken, rapped the public education system unmercifully in thirty minutes of oratory.

He was the guest speaker at an inter-denominational service, organized by the Stouffville Ministerial as part of the community's Canada Week celebrations. Planned for the local park, the worship had to be moved into the Arena due to inclement weather that plagued many of the events.

While many listeners nodded their heads in agreement, just as many were noticeably disturbed, particularly teachers in the public school system. One lady took the pastor to task at the worship's conclusion, claiming that in his criticism, he had painted all (public) educators with the same brush. When the debate appeared to reach an impasse, Dr. Campbell commented, "I think you should measure the thickness of your skin."

The Renaissance leader accused the public school system of being "hostile to Biblical christianity". He tempered this remark somewhat by saying "you are fortunate here."

Dr. Campbell said

that his stand on sex education in the classroom had been twisted to sound like he is opposed to such instruction. I am not, he stated firmly, it's the teachers they select to teach it that bothers me. Instead of being servants of parents, they want to police themselves, he said, likening the practice to "turning monkeys loose in a peanut factory".

The bureaucratic educational institution is unresponsive to the wishes of the people, he said, claiming children are made "wards of the state" from six to sixteen. In many instances, he said, educators hold to the view that man is at the same level as an animal. "Freudian heresy," he said, "is destroying our youngsters and I'll fight it to end".

Dr. Campbell attacked provincial legislators who, on one hand, oppose the showing of a movie called "The Tin Drum" and on the other, encourage children to read a book entitled "The Diviners". He described the latter as "verbal vulgarity". "I find it incomprehensible," he said.

The speaker questioned the public's priorities, noting that many decried junk foods and impure drinking water but permit the use of filthy language in school books. He called it "the worst kind of effluent". "Must we degrade our children so they can live in a degraded world?" he asked.

Turning back to sex education practices, Dr. Campbell said, the teaching of strong moral values should come first. Those seeking permissive safeguards should be provided such instruction separately. "Let them go belly-up downstream with the rest of the dead fish," he said.

Dr. Campbell spoke without notes and in a voice that was audible anywhere in the Arena. He shared the platform with Rev. Howard Minaker, President of the Stouffville Ministerial; Rev. Don Payne; Rev. Phillip Poole; Rev. Jim Byrne and song-leader, Jim Rehili. Special music was provided by the Emmanuel International Singers, Annie Simons and piper, David Nelson. The organist was Clarion Baker.

The children's story was told by Barbara Wideman. With a Bavarian Festival the night before, rink staff had to work into the early-morning hours, preparing the facility for the service. By 10:30 a.m., everything was in readiness.

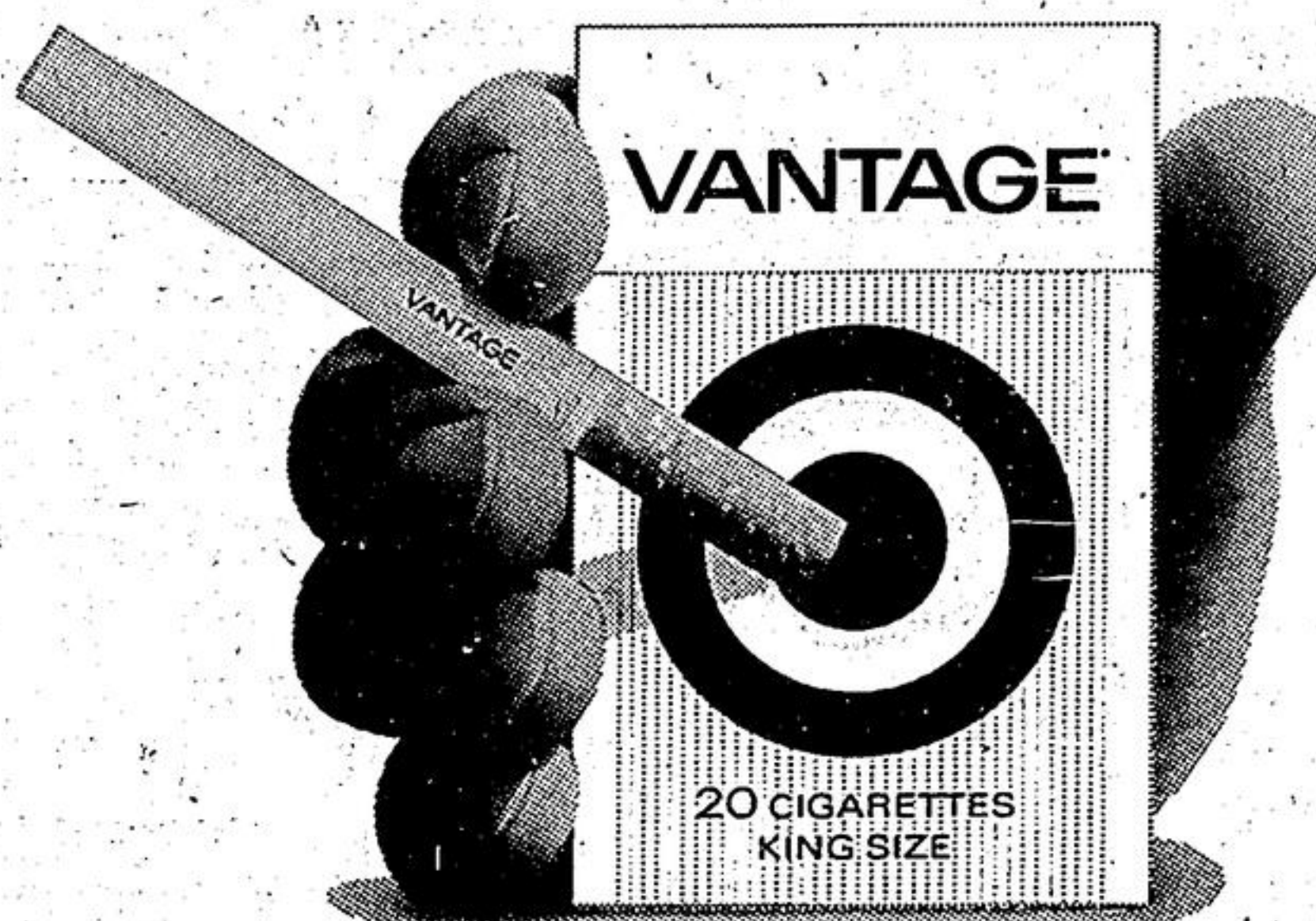
Films which have sparked a great deal of interest recently were on "The Insect World", "Grouse Country", and "Big Horn Sheep".

## Killed in collision

**WHITCHURCH** - A tragic accident, early Monday morning at the intersection of Steeles Avenue and Brimley Road, took the life of a 45-year old Whitchurch-Stouffville man.

Kevin Boyd, a former Metro Toronto detective, was northbound on Brimley when his car, a 1978 Chevrolet Caprice, veered out of control, hit a tree and came to rest in a nearby field.

The victim, a resident of R.R.3, Newmarket, died almost instantly. Wife Shirley, 44; son Bradley, six and Donald Edwards, nine of Base Borden, were injured, the two boys seriously. Mrs. Boyd was treated in Scarborough Centenary Hospital and released.
