A camera that talks to itself? Sort of. The new sonar auto-focusing cameras from Polaroid send out sound waves that echo to the subject and back - automatically setting the lens at the precise focus for a perfect instant picture.

Cameras that "talk" assure sharp focus

As photographic films and lenses become faster (that is, more sensitive) and flash becomes easier to carry and more automatic, it becomes evident that you can shoot anything you can see. But what about things you can't see? Like the garden party that's still going strong at midnight. There are pictures there, but where?

Focusing has always been the principle stumbling block for serious — and even unserious photographers. As soon as you leave the innocent world of fixed-focus lenses, you're on your own. And every day the sun goes down.

Even during the day you find . youself in rooms that defy precise focusing. Or is it the camera and its confounded ground glass - or lines which refuse to line up - that's the problem? By the time you're ready to shoot that marvelous unposed

picture, it's posed - or gone. The problem has been solved by the same people who brought you the wonder of instant photographs. How does it work? Fast - in milliseconds! With echoing sound waves. Faster than you can focus a camera manually. As fast as you can press the button to shoot the

picture! . And how accurately does it focus? Down to millimeters! More accurately, usually, than normal eyesight can focus.

But isn't it just the latest instance of gadgetry for the sake of gadgetry, another encumbrance for the camera's - and the photographer's - pure vision? Well, freeing you to do the seeing and dispense with the fumbling is the whole idea behind it. The mechanism adds virtually no weight to the camera, and fits snugly into the housing. But now you can stop saying, "It's in focus, it's not in focus. It's in focus, it's not in focus."
