Children need extended family

What do we mean by the phrase "the extended family"? It is certainly one we have heard many times. It means, first of all, people - caring people - children, parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins, friends. It means that parents no longer have to "go it alone". It means that children can have more than one or two adults on which to depend.

For the parents, it means there is help available. After all, parents are people with needs, too. They need time to be alone, separately and together; time to be persons as well as parents. Too many parents feel they should make their children their reason for living only to find that when they grow up and leave home to make their own lives they, the parents, have nothing left. That is too heavy a responsibility for a child to bear.

The extended family can solve the dilemma of finding enough time and energy for both children and parents. Wouldn't it be nice to have someone take over for a little while before the situation overtakes you?

As part of an extended family, a child will develop and learn in a varied environment rather than in one

restricted to a very limited outlook. S/he will learn that love and affection need not be confined to a special few but can be shared among many. New experiences and different life-styles will help to broaden his/her understanding of the world.

She will discover too, that his/her needs do not have to be met by one person nor go unsatisfied. This promotes a healthy attitude toward relationships later in life. When essential emotional

needs are satisfied in childhood, the adult will not still be searching for someone - friend or mate - to meet those needs. Nor will s/he expect that one person to be able to meet adult needs.

It is our belief that a healthier, more dependent child will be the result of living within the care of a responsible extended family and that the members of that family will find more joy than responsibility.

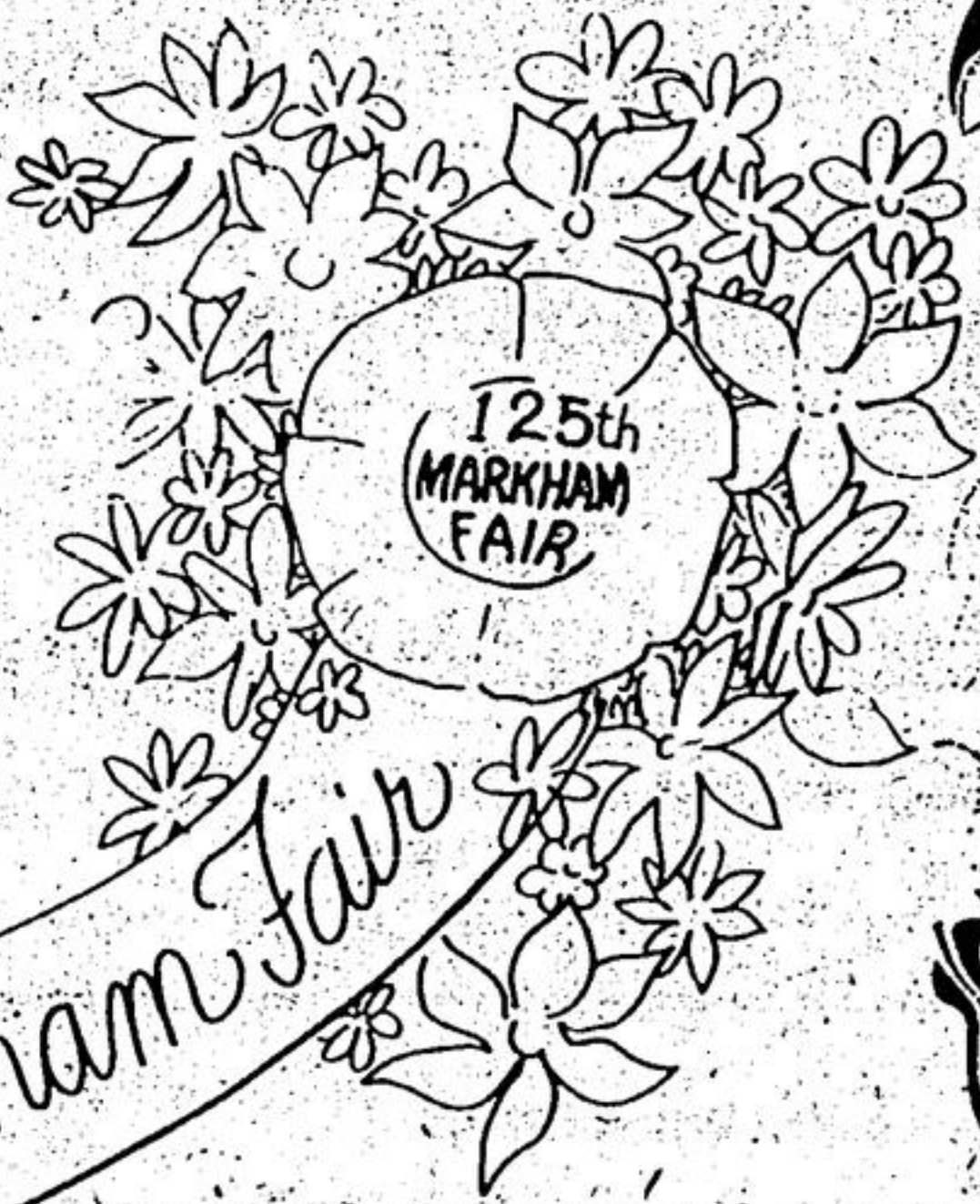
