Markham Fair

"a happening"

MARKHAM — Four days each year, a docile piece of farm real estate, located in a rural part of Markham, is transformed into a vibrant country fairground, alive with swarming vitality.

How does this all happen? Who handles the 20,000 cars and the 100,000 people?

Preparation for a Fair of such size begins back in May. While most folks are thinking about summer vacations, directors are talking security, ticket sales and parking.

Up until the late 50's, security, parking and gate controls were handled by the directors with the help of local service clubs and other organizations in the area. Also, the Board had the right to deputize "special constables" from among its members. Since the 1960's, however, the policy has been to hire

outside assistance and up to 1977, when the Fair moved to its present location, Toronto security firms were hired under contract.

More recently, that too was changed. Dennis Seeley, a Metro Police Sergeant and a 1st Vice-President on the Board, arranged a contract with two army and airforce cadet instructors. These young Canadians saw the Fair through "the worst rains in 30 years" and still came up smiling.

Said Seeley "there is no doubt, the Board had a real concern over its decision that year, but there wasn't a single person, director or committee member that didn't retain a tremendous feeling of pride for the way these young men and women performed under the worst possible circumstances".

This year, the committee, co-chaired by

Harold Snowball and Dave Morrison, will be utilizing the service of Markham Cadets under the supervision of Capt. Geol., Eades.

In line with this, the Gates and Admission Committee, under the direction of 2nd Vice-President Bill Walker, fills its ranks with off-duty firemen, bank tellers and cashiers. "I tell you, when I walk into a room and three bank managers say "Hi Bill", it makes me feel pretty important," he joked.

Many of these helpers return year after year, like Vera Craig and Betty McLean. "They've been with us as long as I can remember," says Walker.

So, on Fair days, Oct. 2, 3, 4 and 5, if you see any of these folks performing their duties, say hello. They may be too busy to reply, but they'll appreciate the recognition just the same.
