**Honored at party**

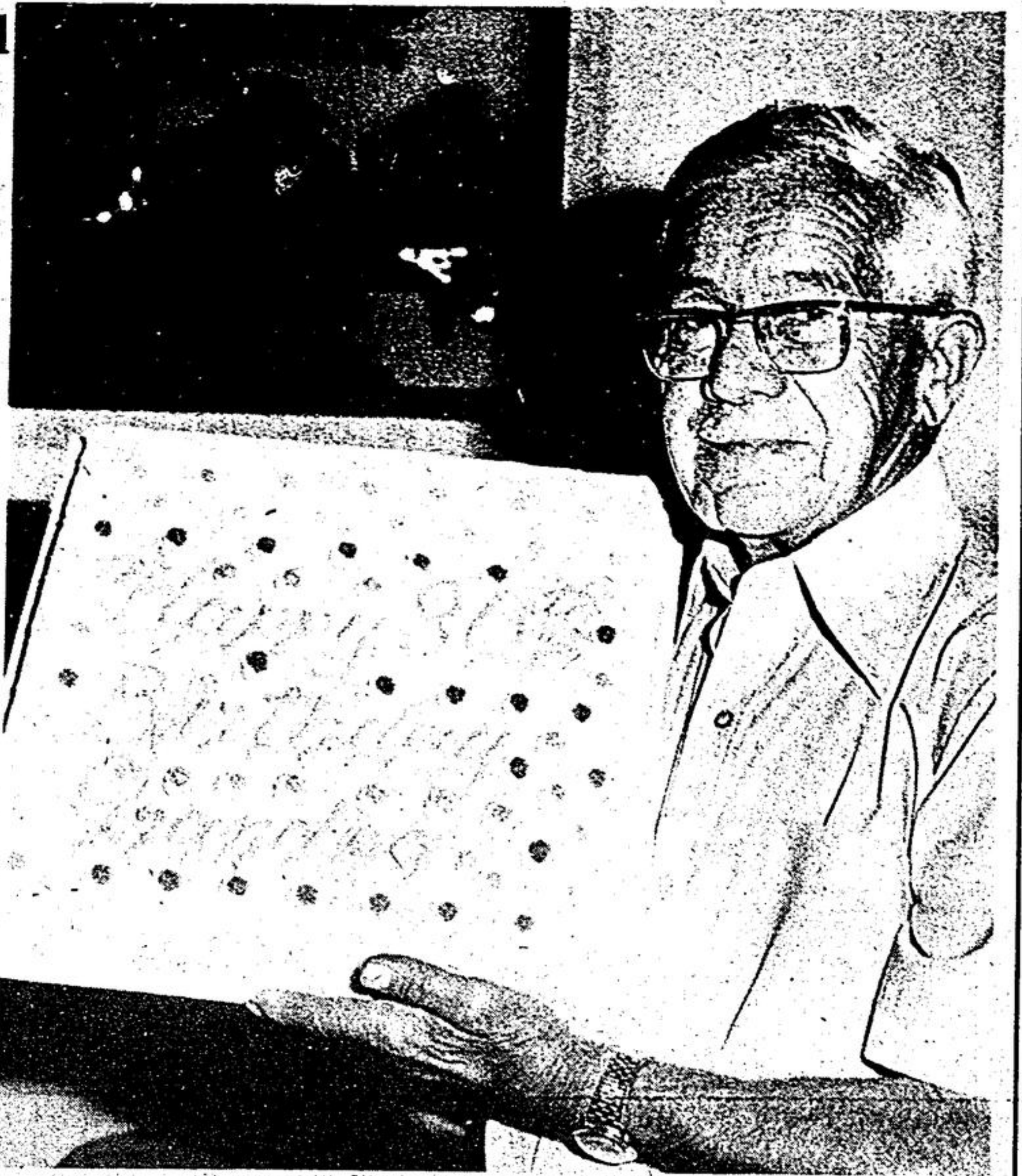

John Snowball, Main Street North, Markham was honored Saturday on the occasion of his eightieth birthday. Jim Thomas

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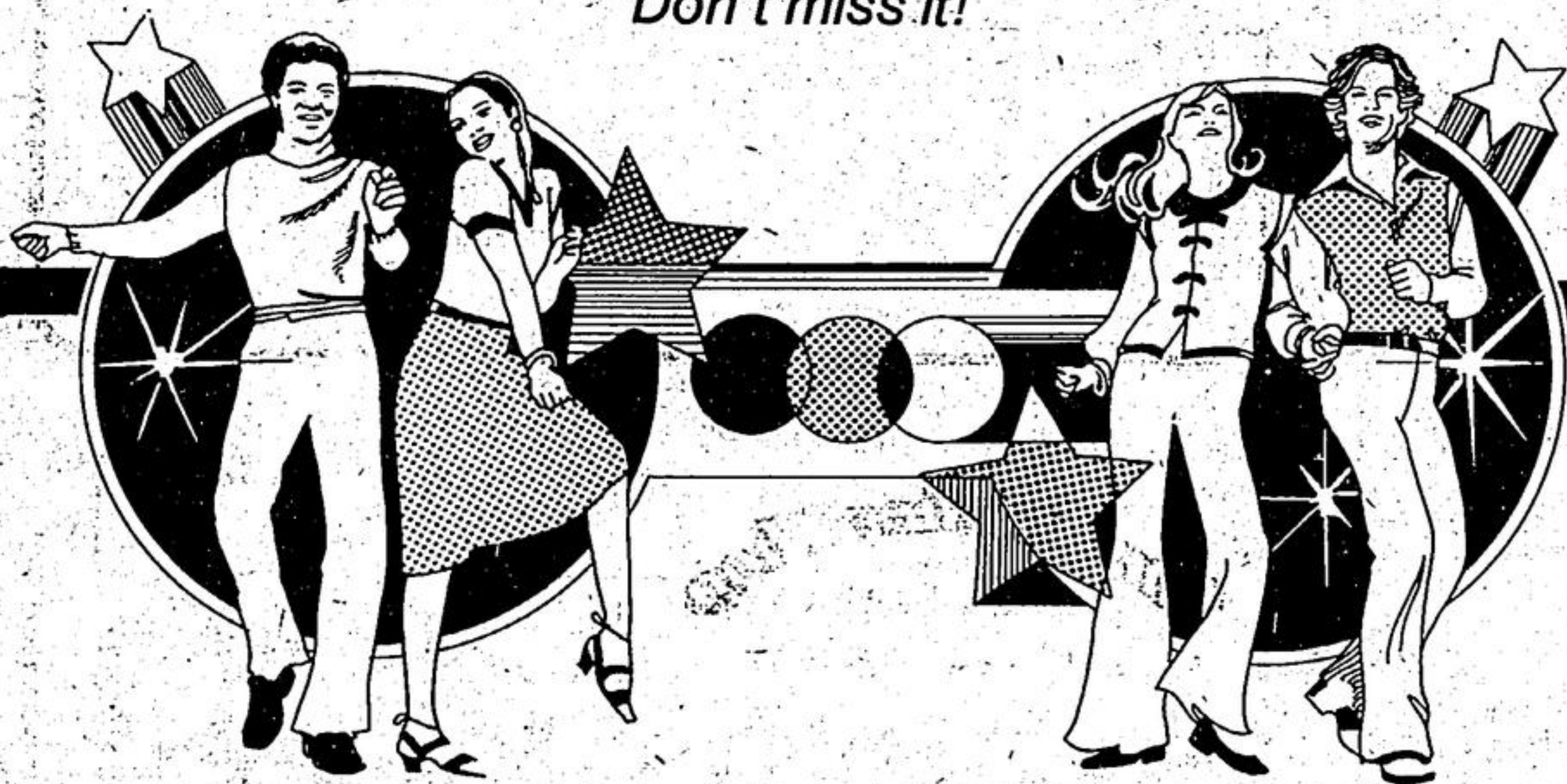

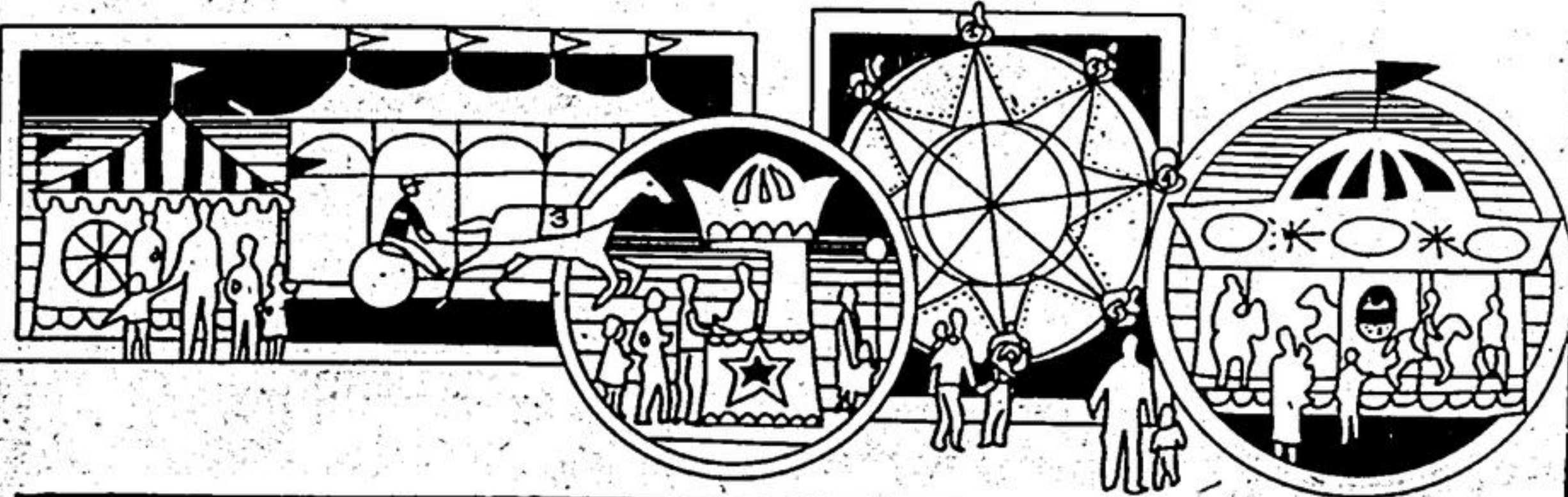

**'Well' problem**

**WHITCHURCH** — A Gormley resident was to meet with York Regional engineering commissioner, Bob Hodgson, last week, in a further effort at redress for a salt-polluted well on his property.

Ed Hakonson, Concession 6, first appeared before Whitchurch-Stouffville Council in July. At that time, he said, following the build up of a road by his house, his well had become polluted from salt flowing onto his property.

Hakonson said he had to dig a new well at a cost of \$5,240, with no prospect of getting his money back. An insurance company had rejected his claim, after it had been turned over to it by York Region.

He said, too, the Ministry of the Environment had agreed the well was "contaminated with salt, aggravated by insufficient ditching."

Council subsequently looked into his claim through the private systems renewal program, but reported it available only to a group of residents, and not to individuals.

Hakonson said he has since appealed the matter to both York North MPP, Bill Hodgson, and Commissioner Bob Hodgson, to no avail, and was now to appear before the full engineering committee.
