an addition at all. In fact, it's a brand new nursing home, and will eventually replace the present building, a converted, rambling farmbouse, just to the north of it.

As Haluszka, who runs the home with his wife, Natalia, explains, "It is so small now, we couldn't do anything."

The present home is 4,500 square feet and has 36 residents. The new home will house the same 36 residents, but will cover 16,000 square feet.

"We've been begging the ministry (of Health) for years for 14 more beds to make it 50, but they wouldn't allow it." Haluszka said. Dealings on a local level were much better, however. Stouffville Council was "very understanding; very helpful," he said.

"He said he also "shrunk'- the addition from 22,000 to 16,000 square feet, and had to \_veto the idea of senior citizens' apartments and a day care centre; because of the high costs. The new building, which will have a connecting door to the present one, will . cost \$640,000. The hoped for opening date is in February.

The extreme differences between the old and the new can be seen in a quick glance at the plans. Whereas the entire points out, it's not really operation of the former was done in an area of 4,500 square feet, in the new one, the residents have 8,000 square feet of their own, with the other 8,000 covering the various facilities on the ground

Among the latter - all of which are new - are a tuck shop, barber shop, chapel, elevator, activity and physio-therapy room.

The new building will consist of two private rooms, five semi-private ones, with the rest, wards. Sleeping facilities in the present home are made up of a ward and four semi-private rooms.

Adjustable beds. whirlpool baths, an infirmary and examining room and a sunny sitting room, are also among the

The home, itself, has a country club setting, sitting as it does among 14 1/2 acres of lush tree-lined land. The Haluszkas grow most of their own vegetables and have started an orchard. They also have poultry and eggs, some beef cattle, pigs, and even make their own honey.

"I'm old-fashioned," says Haluszka. I don't play golf. Instead of golf, take a hoe and chip away."

With his new building, it looks as if he'll soon have that elusive hole in one.


