

## Controlled growth

That's Councillor Jim Sanders, Ward 6, talking, and the sentiments he relates from a recent encounter with a constituent, are the kind he would like to see preserved.

"I want a lively and interesting place to live," says Sanders. "That takes money, and the people know that .... So, we have to make use of government grants when looking for any programs or facilities."

Implementation the master recommends how to spend money over the next five years, while determining a recreation and cultural plan for the next century, he said.

Sanders would like to see other forms of development in the Town, too, but, "I hear all the time we're controlled by our sewage."

He says the town. "could handle any 'development," but it would cost \$10 million to hook up with the York-Durham sewage plan. "If the demand here was to be like Markham, we could do it, but we aren't after explosive growth."

He looks for more light industry to assist in development.

Sanders also has some other definite areas of concern. Among these: Energy - He initiated a committee, which is now taking inventory of buildings and departments to see how much energy is used. When completed in a month, "then we can see where we can make savings at no cost to the town."
