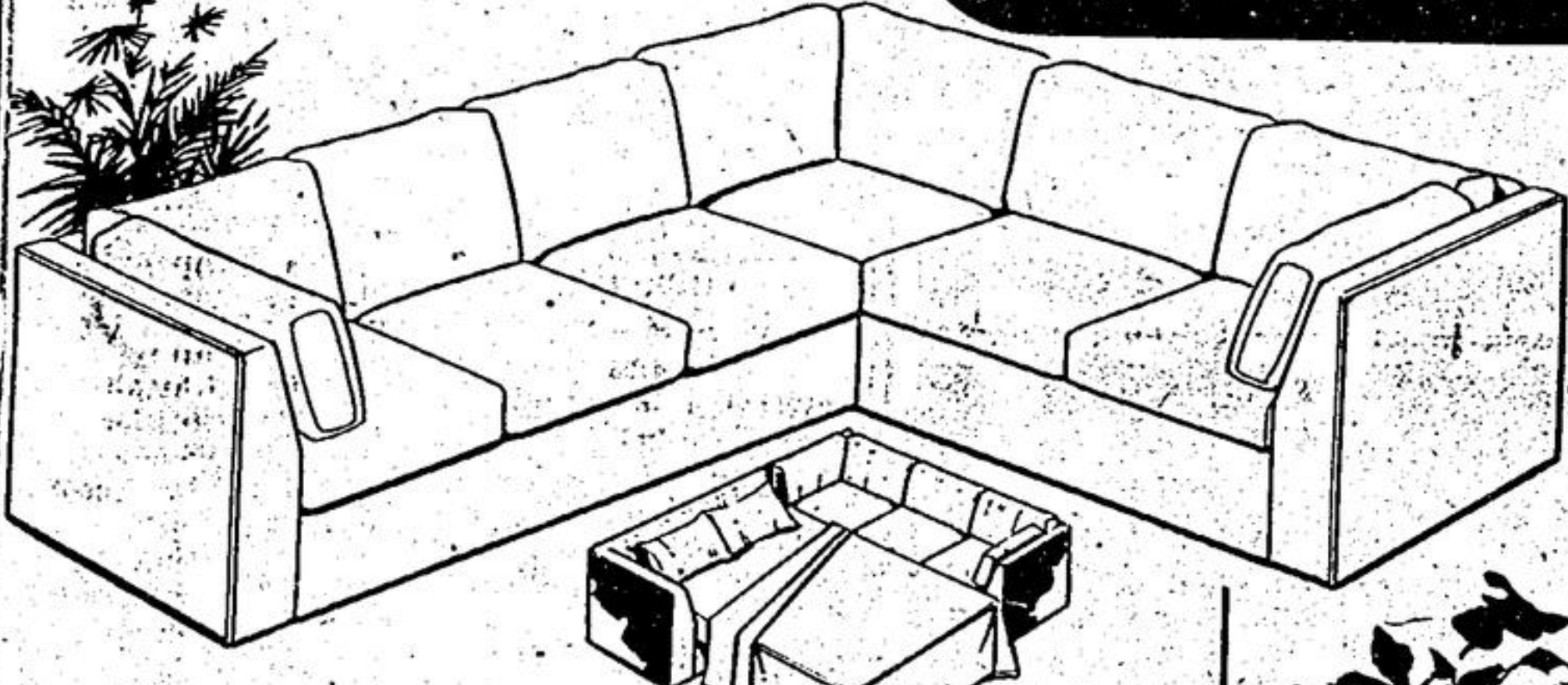
**Band to Buffalo**
