

"It's sure paying off," Principal Muir told The Tribune, "in most cases, the response has been very positive."

However, it would greatly assist the school, he points out, if the parents would call in and let the administration know if their sons and daughters can't be

On an average day, it's not unusual for 25 to 30 students to be away, the principal said.

"Like in any other walk of life, students have an obligation to let their 'employers' know if they can't report in," said Mr. Muir, "we want to make them accountable for their attendance."

Most parents, he said, don't mind being called, even at work.


